and also,



President's Corner



The President's Corner

This is an exciting time at our church. Pastor Kress and his wife, Lisa will be arriving soon and next week is the installation. I hope you all were able to attend. Please join me in a great big THANK-YOU to Pastor T for helping to get our church where it is today. We have been able to get most of our "lost sheep" back where they belong, the youth group is active and growing, and Sunday School is active and growing also. The Child Care is up in numbers of children and in the black. A Farewell/Thank-you fund has been set up as a going away present for him and Peggy. While Pastor Kress will have plenty of projects and concerns to deal with as he starts his new ministry with us, many problems have been taken care of.

A problem that continues to be of major concern is the accounting of the church. This is too much to expect a "part time" volunteer to handle. We now have book-keeping and accounting for a full time business, and a combined budget of close to \$500,000 annually. I had hoped that the new software would make the job easy enough for a volunteer, but now that we have the Child Care being run like the business it should, it is too difficult for our Treasurer to be accountable for both the Child Care and the Church. I have taken the following steps to ensure we are being good stewards of our gifts. First, I will be meeting with the Child Care President, Financial Secretary, and the Treasurer to look into a paid part time bookkeeper or a bookkeeping firm to take over the accounting of both the Church and the Child Care. I will be bringing the results to the full Counsel in May. We had a line item in the 2009 budget for a bookkeeper but eliminated it when the new software was purchased. Secondly, I have asked Leta to open a second savings account for the sole purpose to keep the dedicated funds. I feel strongly that dedicated funds should not be co-mingled with any other funds and should be available at a rate of 100% any time they need to be used. Thirdly, I will ask the Audit Committee to meet twice a year to audit the books instead of only at the end of the year.

The good news financially is that giving is up significantly and our expenses are within budget overall. We are in great shape at the present time, but as we look at some long term replacement items such as the air conditioning units at the church, fellowship, and child care buildings, eventual bus replacement, new roof and floors for the child care, we need to plan now for these future expenses. You will hear more on this at the next voters meeting.

At the end of this month we will be saying good-bye to Pastor Schmidt and his wife. Pastor Schmidt will not be returning as our Winter Pastor next year as he will be taking on much greater responsibilities with his homeowners association. Please take the time to thank him for all his hard work while he was with us. We also have a Thank-you fund for Pastor S to be given to him when he leaves. We hope to see a lot of the Schmidt's in church next year and I am sure many of you that have attended his Bible class will be disappointed.

I am really looking forward to the Child Care fundraiser, going to see the new stadium, and seeing the Stonecrab's baseball game. I think this will be a great time of fellowship, and a neat fundraiser, although I did really like the spaghetti.




2009 Church Actual vs. Budget Year to Date Through April 17, 2009



Gratitude for God's Blessings, May, 2009

"Mayday, Mayday, Mayday!"



The above words really have nothing to do with the month of May except for using "May" as a part of the words. They come from a French phrase which means "come and help us!" and have become an international code asking for help for airplanes and ships in trouble and danger. "Come and help us" may be what many of us are thinking and saying in light of today's gloomy economic conditions. Sadly, too many people are losing their jobs and homes and others are pulling back on their spending and giving because of what is happening financially.

"Why would God allow this?" is a question on the hearts and minds of many people, including faithful Christians. First of all, God did not cause this present condition. It is rather the result of some unwise behavior by many people in the business, financial and political realms. Perhaps we need to frame the question more like this: "What might God be trying to tell and teach us during such economic times as these?"

One thing that He may be trying to teach us is to distinguish more carefully and thoughtfully on the difference between our wants and needs. More often than not we have what we need but don't have everything that we want. The desire to have everything is what gets us into financial difficulty.

Another thing that God may be teaching us is to concentrate more on what is really most important. The truth is that God has already come to answer our "Mayday, Mayday, Mayday!" call by sending His only-begotten Son to be our Savior. Romans 8:32 offers us the assurance of God's care and concern for us: "He who did not spare His own Son, but gave Him up for us all—how will He not also, along with Him, graciously give us all things?" (NIV) Jesus in His Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 6:25-34) encourages us not to be overly concerned with material things because our Heavenly Father knows what we need when it comes to food, clothes, shelter and such things. Will God fulfill all our wants? Probably not, but He will take care of our needs. Because of this assurance Jesus instructs us to "seek first God's kingdom and His righteousness and all these things will be given to us as well." (Matthew 6:33 NIV).

So, in troubling times like today's economy, we can live with the blessed assurance that God loves us and will take care of us so that we can live as His faithful stewards and continue to support generously the work of His church. Nothing done or given for the support of God's work is ever done or given in vain! Or, to put it another way, "God's work done in God's way will never lack for God's supply!"






