THE CHILDREN OF GOD AND THE LITURGY

If you find yourself faithfully attending Divine Services at Redeemer you quickly recognize that in the liturgy we tell and retell, in ritual and in song, the story of God’s plan of salvation for mankind. In so doing, we establish our identity as part of God’s family, finding our place in the long history of God’s people of which we and our children have become a member through Holy Baptism. To gather for this important activity is a duty, that is, a responsibility, not out of compulsion, but in delight and with gladness. From my own experience as a husband and father, I know that there are great benefits for a family who shares the liturgy together.

It begins first with recognizing your own need for God and His gifts freely given in His Word and in His Sacrament. It then continues with a conversation with your child. Not asking the question, “Do you want to go to church?” No! But with a conversation explaining why attending church is critical to us as His children. This will help convey the importance of the Divine Service.

Through your attitude, your child will sense that participation in the liturgy is a joyous opportunity and a fulfilling experience. Your expectations that your child will participate in liturgy (standing, sitting, praying, singing, listening, etc.) will speak volumes that say that children, too, are members of the Body of Christ. Guiding children in worship is a privilege, a joy, and a treasure. It can be accomplished in love for them and in love for God.

So, as a parent, what do I do? Below are some ways you can before, during, and after service engage in conversations with your children about the liturgy.

BEFORE THE DIVINE SERVICE

- ◆ Talk about expectations on your way to church.
- ◆ Get a drink and visit the restroom before entering the sanctuary.
- ◆ Sit where your child can readily see the chancel area and visually participate in the liturgy. Sitting up front can be very helpful for this.
- ◆ Point out the pulpit, altar, lectern, organ and communion rail. Discuss how they are used.
- ◆ Look for colors and symbols in the banners, windows, paraments and other artwork.

- ◆ Explain that they are there to remind us of God’s love and care.
- ◆ Find the crosses in the church. Tell your child that the cross reminds us of Jesus.
- ◆ Talk about people who help during the service and mention the jobs they do (pastor, usher, elder, organist, crucifer, acolyte, etc.).

DURING THE LITURGY

- ◆ Be consistent in your expectations and routines.
- ◆ Allow your child to sit in a comfortable manner.
- ◆ If your child wiggles, avoid fretting: Adults wiggle, too (especially when hearing the Law)!
- ◆ Participate joyfully! Your child will model your actions. Don’t worry that your child doesn’t listen to what you say, know that he or she watches everything that you do.
- ◆ Make church a warm and loving place to be. Discipline in a kind manner. Demonstrate forgiveness.
- ◆ Help your child listen for a key word, such as Jesus, God, love. Look ahead in the readings to discover another word that will be used often today.
- ◆ Explain what is happening as the service unfolds – the movement from the Service of the Word towards the Service of the Sacrament. Answer your child’s questions briefly and accurately.
- ◆ Involve your child in the Divine Service. Sing together. Fold hands for prayers; stand, sit at appropriate times. Take them to communion with you that they may receive a Baptismal blessing.

AFTER THE LITURGY

- ◆ Greet the pastor at the door. Lift your child to be at the pastor’s eye level or wait for the pastor to kneel to your child’s eye level. Encourage your child to shake hands with the pastor.
- ◆ Present the pastor with a picture of worship that your child drew during the offering. This is your child’s offering to God.

THE CHILDREN OF GOD AND THE LITURGY (continued)

- ◆ Talk about the worship service by mentioning parts that were especially meaningful to you (the hymn of the day, the sermon, Holy Absolution, Holy Communion, etc.)
- ◆ Make a Giving Thanks booklet. Have your child draw pictures that reflect what God has done or things for which your child is thankful. Present the book to your pastor the following Sunday.
- ◆ Sing hymns and songs together.
- ◆ Read and reflect on Scripture readings together.
- ◆ Pray for the pastor, organist, and others who have led the liturgy. Pray for the congregation and congregation members who were included in prayers in the worship service.

- ◆ Encourage your child to draw a picture for Jesus (of worship, of Jesus' love, of a favorite Bible story) and take this to worship to place in the offering plate the following Sunday.

This is not an exhaustive list of things for you to do, nor are they things you should always do before, during, and after the Divine Service. However, they are things you can begin to incorporate into preparing you and your children to faithfully go to church.

And just as a reminder to all members of the church: You are all children of God. Therefore this little newsletter article wasn't intended for parents with children, but was also intended for children loved by God of every age.

A FAITHFUL PASTOR

Following his visit with Redeemer for our 40th Anniversary celebration, Dr. Peter Scaer posted the following on his Facebook page:

A Faithful Pastor

We all have feet of clay. God has given us talents, but not all of them. And Lord knows we have our faults. Which is to say, pastors are people. We aim to please, but we aren't people pleasers. Our allegiance lies higher.

Such thoughts run through my head as I visit with pastors, this time, the faithful James Kress. Every ministry has its ups and downs, its joys and sorrows. What does a faithful pastor appreciate most? Well, he's got to put food on the table; most have a family to take care of. But what really makes his day is a people with ears open to Christ's word.

And what should people look for in a pastor? We'd like if he were a dynamic preacher, whatever that might mean. Who doesn't rock the boat, at least not too much. I suppose, you could list all the qualities you'd like, and get your man. Would that be to your benefit?

I don't know. I doubt it. Christ was loved by some, dismissed by others. St. Paul didn't fare well in Corinth. His members like other pastors better. The prophets? Forget about it. Manage to arrange for manna from heaven, and eventually, they'll turn on you.

So, what do you want in a pastor? Nothing more or less than faithfulness. A pastor who will speak the truth because he loves you, and because he loves God more.

When I see congregations fighting faithful pastors, I'm left perplexed and saddened. They are only hurting themselves. Surely, we must bear one another's burdens, and put up with idiosyncrasies. But if you have a faithful pastor, one who loves Christ, who preaches Christ, who visits you when sick, who wants to teach you and your children, then give thanks to God. You are blessed beyond all measure. And if he says something that chafes, that rubs you the wrong way, talk to him. Ask whether what he says is true. More often than not, he's saying it because he actually loves you, and loves God even more.

And if you have a pastor who is easily blown by every wind, who cares only to please you, wishes never to rock the boat, then challenge him to do better. And if the Word of God is not to him supreme, find a pastor who cares more for God's approval than for yours. The church is more than a social club, and you shouldn't stay in place simply because your friends are there. The good guys are out there, and there's no reason to throw good money and time after bad, to buy bread that is not bread. Vote with your feet, and vote for faithfulness.



Some disciples of John the Baptist were questioning him about the baptism and preaching of Jesus. Many disciples were going to Jesus instead of John the Baptist.

John the Baptist answers: “A person cannot receive even one thing unless it is given him from heaven” (John 3:27).

John the Baptist says this to show that Jesus, His teaching, and His baptism are from heaven. God provides everything we have in body and soul.

We are taught this in the meaning of the Apostles’ Creed in the *Small Catechism*.

In the First Article of the Creed, we learn that God has made us and everything in the universe.

“He has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my reason and all my senses, and still takes care of them. He also gives me clothing and shoes, food and drink, house and home, wife and children, land, animals, and all I have. He richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life. He defends me against all danger and guards and protects me from all evil. All this He does only out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in me. For all this it is my duty to thank and praise, serve and obey Him.”

In the Second Article of the Creed, we learn that God sent His Son, Jesus, to humble Himself by taking the form of a servant.

In so doing, He “has redeemed me, a lost and condemned person, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil; not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death, that I may be His own and live under Him in His kingdom and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as He is risen from the dead, lives and reigns to all eternity.”

In the Third Article of the Creed, we learn that the fruits of what Jesus Christ, the Son of God, did are given to us through the work of the Holy Spirit in the Church.

“That I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him; but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith. In the same way He calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth, and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith. In this Christian church He daily and richly forgives all my sins and the sins of all believers. On the Last Day He will raise me and all the dead, and give eternal life to me and all believers in Christ.”

Indeed, “a person cannot receive even one thing unless it is given him from heaven.”

But how easy is this for us to forget? How easy is it for us to think that what we have in life is because we have earned it?

How easy is it for us to forget that all our skills – the abilities of our hands and minds, the ethic to work diligently, and the desire to improve – is given to us from heaven, just as John the Baptist said?

How easy is it for us to forget that it is Christ alone, and the work of the Holy Spirit, that reveals His salvation to us, delivers it to us, and that none of this is our doing?

Sure, we have responsibility for coming to church, for delving into God's Holy Word, and for praying without ceasing.

But even these responsibilities are given to us from heaven. These duties are not earned; they are given in response to what He has accomplished for us.

Everything we have, and everything we are – in both body and soul – are gifts from God in heaven.

Let us then respond in thanksgiving and give back to Him as He asks – with a first-fruits, generous proportion offering of what He has given to us.

Sunday Morning Bible Class for the Life of the World

As the church journeys toward heaven, it teaches the Word of the LORD, it washes at the font, and it feeds according to the will of the LORD. As God's people, we gather in a place called church and we attend Divine Service because it is there that God gives us the gift of His Son Jesus Christ. This is a promise that He has given us as the people of God, and it is the greatest gift that God could give us.

This promise of the gift of our Lord Jesus Christ comes to us when we are gathered in His name, because He has bound Himself to the preaching of the gospel, and the giving of Himself in the sacraments.

Now, from the world's perspective these are not important gifts, and yet from God's perspective, they are the most important gifts that He could give. We believe, teach and confess that our Lord Jesus Christ is present within our church according to His flesh. And the fact that the eternal God could be present amongst us in His flesh, through simple Words, through simple water, and through simple bread and wine, is part of the "MYSTERY" that we call the Liturgy of the Church.

Come explore this mystery with us following Divine Service each Sunday. This 12 session series on our Lutheran Liturgy is presented by Dr. Arthur Just in DVD form. For each session, a study guide will be provided. Dr. Just, professor at Concordia Seminary, Ft. Wayne, IN, leads viewers through a presentation of our liturgical heritage and its Scriptural origins.

The sessions include: An Introduction to the Lutheran Liturgy, The Structure of Liturgy, Jewish Origins in Christian Worship, the Table Fellowship of Jesus and Structure of Word and Sacrament, Liturgy in the Life of Jesus, The Liturgy of the Word, The Liturgy of the Sacrament, The Entrance, Preparation and Distribution, The Lutheran Liturgy: 1941, 182 and beyond, the Church Year and Sunday, the Lord's Day, The Services of Prayer, Catechesis, Baptism and the Liturgy of Life.

WEDNESDAY MORNING BIBLE

CLASS: Come join us on Wednesdays at 10 AM in the Narthex for an exciting Table Talk discussion. Ask Pastor just about any question. We will search the Scriptures. We will have open dialog in the study of the Holy Scripture. Again, your questions and our discussion may range from current events to ancient church history.
