"My heart is captive to the word of God ... Here I stand, I can do no other ... so help me God." I hope you'll recognize these words of Dr. Martin Luther. You'll probably also recall that he didn't speak them lightly. He knew that "standing on the promises" of God's Word could very well cost him his life. Yet there he stood ... before pope and princes ... knowing that the only hope he had was the God for whose sake he stood on trial.

As "Reformation Day" comes again this month (probably wrestling with "Halloween" just to get our attention) how easy it is for us heirs and beneficiaries of Dr. Martin Luther to settle for a reformation that is more costume than substance. We sing "A Mighty Fortress". We extol the eternal virtues of "Faith alone", "Grace alone", and "Scripture alone". But I wonder if the reformation spirit ever trickles over into our real lives.

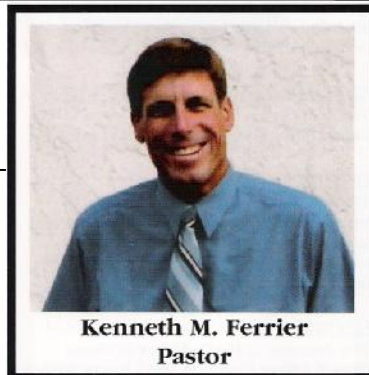
You know, the lives where we are confronted by fears which are just as great as those experienced by Martin Luther when he stood trial as a heretic facing execution. "What's going to happen to my family if this chemotherapy doesn't work?" ... "if I get one of those "pink slips" at work?" ... "if my work causes us to leave the home and people we know and love?" At times such as these can we say, "Here I stand ... so help me God"? Do we look to God as *our* mighty fortress? Do we really put our trust in His promises?

What about the temptations which would draw us away from God, or deceive us into thinking "a little compromise won't hurt anything"? Money ... and the many things we can get with it; Pleasures ... in all of its forms and flavors. Can we stay focused on what

God's Word says? Can we take our stand on "scripture alone" and "faith alone" even when it seems that we will be giving up so much if we do?

Certainly there is a lot about the Reformation that qualifies as *history*. It's the story of what God did in time ... among certain people and places. But the truths which lie at the heart of the Reformation are not buried in the past. They are as current as the most recent trial or challenge confronting you in your Christian life. The expanse of God's grace; the firm foundation of Scripture; the derived power of faith are all *yours*. The same God who preserved the truth of His Word in the 16th century still stands behind that Word ... and in the midst of His Church ... today. The same power that gave victory to Martin Luther -- and the many others who were used by God to "reform" His Church -- is available to see us through our battles against sin, and Satan, and even our own sinful selves.

Most importantly, the same Savior brings the same soul-cleansing, life-changing forgiveness to us that Martin Luther found as he agonized over his sin and guilt. On the basis of God's unchanging Word we sinners are assured that we are saved by God's grace alone, through faith alone, for the sake of Christ alone!!! May that assurance -- that *Savior* -- enable us all to stand tall as we face the foes of our own time and experience.

Funds that we should be using to expand our ministry to our community or make it more effective are being used to meet our operating expenses. We cannot continue to operate in this manner.

So we have much to look forward to, end of hurricane season, warm sunny low humidity days, family and friends in the up coming holiday season, a Long Range Plan in place, a realistic budget, but best of all nothing to worry about because we are fortunate because it is all in HIS hands.

Stewardship

The Lutheran Church Missouri Synod encourages the study of the biblical Stewardship Principles developed by the Department of Stewardship several years ago. Your Board of Stewardship is presenting in the next several monthly newsletters one of these eight principles. We hope you take the time to read and study these, and that you find them helpful. One of the Stewardship Principles follows:

GOD'S STEWARDS LIVE WITH AN AWARENESS OF THE PRESENT AND FUTURE, OF TIME AND ETERNITY

What does this mean:

God's stewards live intentionally in the light of the Lord's eternal purpose while being firmly committed to the here and now.

What does God's Word say about this?

Matt. 6:19-21 Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

1 Tim. 6:17-19 Command those who are rich in this present world not to be arrogant nor to put their hope in wealth, which is so uncertain, but to put their hope in God, who richly provides us with everything for our enjoyment. Command them to do good, to be rich in good deeds, and to be generous and willing to share. In this way they will lay up treasure for themselves as a firm foundation for the coming age, so that they may take hold of the life that is truly life.

Phil. 3:12-14, 20 Not that I have already obtained all this, or have already been made perfect, but I press on to take hold of that for which Christ Jesus took hold of me. Brothers, I do not consider myself yet to have taken hold of it. But one thing I do: Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus. But our citizenship is in heaven. And we eagerly await a Savior from there, the Lord Jesus Christ.

2 Pet. 3:11-12a Since everything will be destroyed in this way, what kind of people ought you to be? You ought to live holy and godly lives as you look forward to the day of God and speed its coming.

Rev. 14:13 Then I heard a voice from heaven say, "Write: Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord from now on." "Yes," says the Spirit, "they will rest from their labor, for their deeds will follow [with] them."

How is this done?

As children of God through faith in Jesus Christ, and with the Holy Spirit's help, we will:

- Point out the eternal dimensions inherent in all that stewards decide to do or not to do;
- Pursue good planning for the present and future as part of stewardship education; and,
- Rejoice in knowing what God's stewards do now can have lasting benefits.

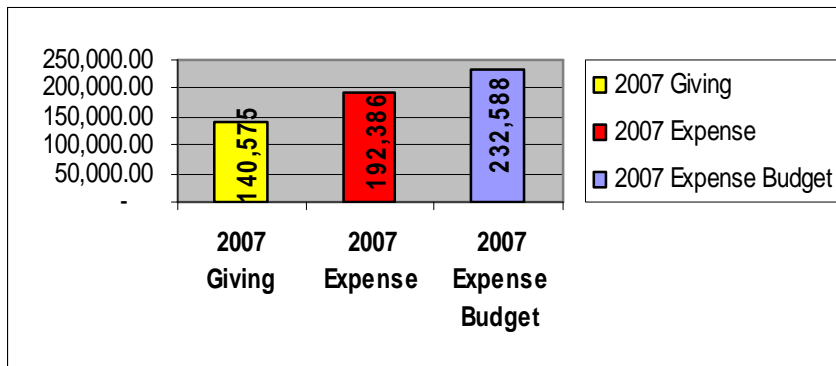
As children of God through faith in Jesus Christ, and with the Holy Spirit's help, we will not:

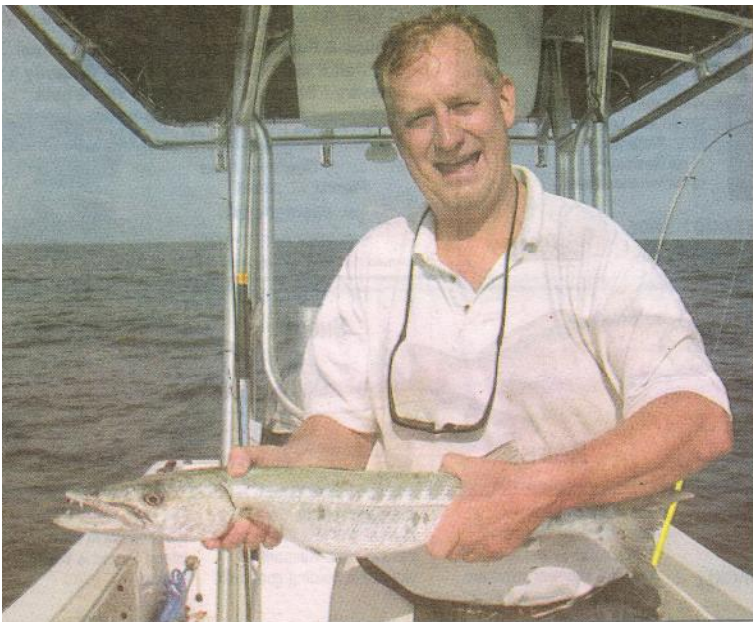

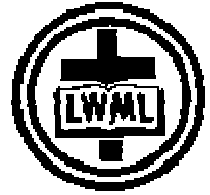
Thanksgiving Day Dinner

The Lutheran Women's Missionary League, also known as "Lutheran Women in Mission", focuses on affirming each woman in her relationship with Christ, to enable her to be in ministry among people of the world. More than 5,000 people attended the convention in June 2007 at Sioux Falls, SD under the theme "Rest On Christ the King" or "ROCK". The delegates adopted a record \$1.7 million mission goal. The funds raised by the organizations 250,000 members nationwide over the next two years will be used to support 18 mission grants. These funds are gathered through Mite Box offerings and donations.

The mission goal for the last biennium 2005-07 was exceeded by \$55,106! An unheard of achievement in church groups. God has truly blessed this organization's 65-year history. The women at Redeemer are a part of this national organization.

Stephen Ministry



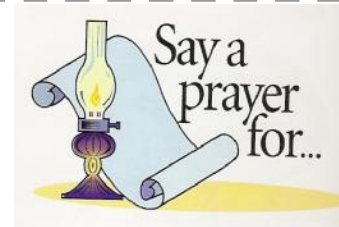

We continue to thank **ALL** who serve as host or hostess for our coffee hour.

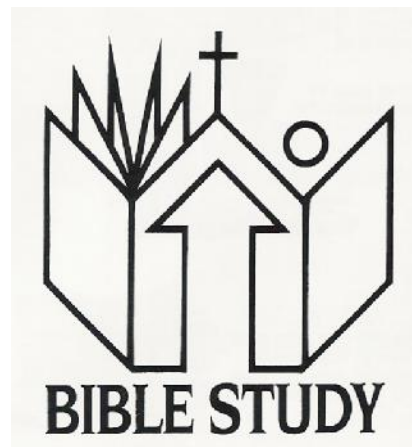

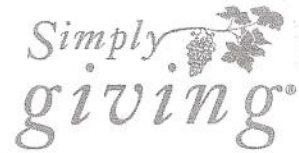

Hands That Give



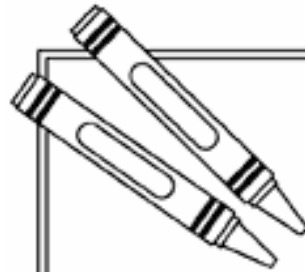
There are many ways you can give to others.

What you need:

- Colored paper
- Scissors
- Markers or crayons
- Yarn or heavy string
- Clothespins or paper clips

What you do:

1. With your parents' help, think of seven (or more) things that you can do for seven (or more) people. For example, you could clean out closets and donate the items to charity, help a neighbor bring in her trash, and so on.
2. Trace your hand on the paper seven times. Cut out each hand.
3. On one side of each hand, write a person's name. On the other side, write how you will help him or her.
4. Cut a long piece of yarn (or heavy string) and hang it in your room – like a clothesline.
5. Use the clothespins or paper clips to hang each hand on the "clothesline."
6. When you've completed each act of service, take the hand off, but keep it to use another time.
7. Do this activity over and over again by "giving a hand" to someone.
