THE SOUND OF ADVENT: *HE IS COMING!*

The beginning of a new church year is here and with it the sound of God's promise: "He is coming!"

The church year begins with a preparatory season called "Advent." The word "advent" comes from the Latin word *adventus*, meaning "appearing" or "coming," referring to the appearing of a great king or even a god. In Christian usage, it refers to the appearing of Jesus Christ in two ways; first His appearing as the Child born of the Virgin Mary and second, His appearing in glory on the Last Day to judge the living and the dead. You see, Advent isn't only about getting ready for Christmas. It's also about getting ready for Jesus' final appearing in glory on the Last Day.

We live in the last days, between Christ's first and second appearances. He is always present with us, and always has been since the beginning. His presence is made audible and visible to us by the Spirit through the preached Word and the Sacraments. Only briefly did the Son of God show His face some 2000 years ago. Only at the end will we see His face again when He appears in glory. Until then, we watch and wait for His second advent even as we celebrate His first.

St. Bernard of Clairveaux (1090-1153) wrote the following concerning the coming of Christ: "In the first coming, Christ comes in the flesh and in weakness; in the second, He comes in Spirit and power; in the third, He comes in glory and majesty; and the second coming is the means whereby we pass from the first to the third."

Advent has four distinct Sundays themed by the readings from the holy Gospel:

The 1st Sunday in Advent focuses on Christ's appearing in glory with the image of His triumphal ride into Jerusalem as the messianic King (Luke 19:28-40).

The 2nd Sunday brings John the Baptizer's prophetic voice calling Israel out to the wilderness to "prepare the way of the Lord" (Luke 3:1-14).

The 3rd Sunday again focuses on John the Baptizer, this time on the content of his preaching of repentance and his greatness as the forerunner of the Messiah (Luke 7:18-28).

The 4th Sunday brings to light the attitude of worship when the incarnate Christ contained in the womb of the Virgin Mary, enters Elizabeth's house and John the Baptist leaps in joyful faith while in his mother's womb (Luke 1:39-45).

Advent is a season of quiet anticipation and expectation. The One who once came in humility by way of Bethlehem's manger, David's donkey, and Calvary's cross, is the who now comes to us hidden in His holy Word and the blessed Sacrament of His body and blood, and will soon come visibly in radiant glory to raise the dead and give eternal life to all who call on His Name. The tone of Advent is joyful anticipation, a mixture of holy fear and expectant joy, like that of a mother-to-be awaiting the arrival of her first baby.

Advent is a time of sober patience. Sadly, our instant gratification culture seems to have had more influence on the Church than the Church has had on the surrounding culture. Advent has been gobbled up by the frenzy of the "holidays," which now begin after Halloween! By the time Christmas arrives, most are too weary to worship and too burned out from decking the halls to celebrate the birth of the world's Savior with any degree of joy much less energy. Remember, Christmas is a twelve day feast, *beginning* on December 25th. In celebrating Advent in all its somber, sober watchfulness, we Christians can give a priceless gift to each other and to the world by showing the patient hope we have in Jesus' coming.

The season has its own peculiar customs and traditions. One cherished tradition is the Advent wreath. This evergreen wreath with four candles is a tradition from northern Europe. Each candle stands for one of the four Sundays in Advent. The first candle, or the Prophet Candle, symbolizes the hope and anticipation of Christ's coming in the flesh as prophesied so many places in the Old Testament. The second candle recalls how Christ appeared in the flesh in humble manner, being born of a virgin in the insignificant village of Bethlehem. This is why this candle is often referred to as the Bethlehem Candle. The third candle, pink in color, is known as the Shepherds' Candle. It recalls the rejoicing of the shepherds when they departed after having seen the Christ-child in the stable. The fourth candle is the Angels' Candle. It reminds us of the heavenly host that announced the good news of our Savior's birth.

Newsletter Deadline



Stephen Ministry



The name Stephen comes from St. Stephen, who was the first lay person commissioned by the apostles to provide caring ministry to those in need.

During the time of the early church, the apostles decided to choose among their faithful disciples those who would be sent into the community to minister to the needs of the people. *"And they chose Stephen, a man full of faith and the Holy Spirit" Acts 6:5*

Stephen Ministry is grounded in Jesus' command to love one another. Through one to one caring and confidential relationships, those who are hurting receive the love and care they need to support them. A Stephen Minister is a child of God who walks beside a hurting person, a caring Christian friend who really listens and a lay person who received 50 hours of training in how to provide distinctively Christian care.

You can be involved through praying for our Stephen Ministers and care receivers, staying sensitive to those who need caring support and alert a Stephen Minister of that need, make others aware of the support system at Redeemer and consider God's direction as to whether you should become a Stephen Minister.

Redeemer training begins in January 2010, one day per week for 5 hours. The commissioning service will be in March. We learn to love each other, laugh at and with each other and sometimes cry together, that is, at least the ladies sometimes do some crying. The closed circle of the wreath is a symbol of God's eternity. Like the circle, our Lord is without beginning and without end. The evergreen branches represent the eternal life that is ours through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, a life that transcends death itself. Just as the evergreen remains alive and fresh even in the dead of winter, so Jesus fills us with new life even in death. "I am the Resurrection and the Life. He who believes in me will live even though he dies; and whoever lives and believes in me will never die" (John 11:25-26).

The candles remind us of Jesus Christ, who is the Light of the world, the Light no darkness can overcome. They also represent all baptized believers in Jesus who reflect His light into the darkness of this world and proclaim Him who called them out of darkness into His marvelous light (1 Peter 2:9-10). Each successive week in Advent, another candle is lit. Sometimes smaller candles or little red berries are added to count off the days between Sundays. At Christmas Eve, a single white Christ candle is added to the Advent wreath, signifying the appearing of Christ in the world.

As the candles on the Advent wreath burn ever more brightly with the approach of Christmas, we are reminded of how near is the coming of our Savior Jesus Christ. Good news indeed! He comes to judge the world in His righteousness, and the verdict will be "innocent" in His atoning death. Your faith in Him will not be in vain. He comes to save!


Other Advent customs include the Advent calendar with its little doors or pockets each concealing a gift or Scripture verse and counting the days to Christmas, and the "Jesse Tree," depicting the family tree of Jesus as the promised Branch from the stem of Jesse (Isaiah 11:1). Advent calendars and Jesse Trees make fun family projects during the season of Advent.

The intent of Advent is not to "take the fun" out of Christmas but to restore the joy and celebration to Christmas by having a period of prayerful preparation and to put the holy back into the December "holidays."

As we celebrate Christ's first coming by way of the Virgin and the manger, and as we delight in His sacramental coming to us in the Word and Supper, we await His coming in glory at a day and an hour no one knows.

So join us during this coming season making the sound of Advent: "*He is coming!*" And be prepared to join us in the celebration of His first coming in our many Christmas services as well as into the New Year and the Epiphany season too.



Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you.” Matthew 28:19

The Apostle John tells us “[t]he Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the One and Only, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth.” And then, “John [the Baptist] *testifies* concerning him. He *cries out*,

...From the fullness of his grace we have all received one blessing after another. For the law was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ.” John 1:15-16.

John the Baptist *testified* time and again about Jesus, the One and Only. We, too, are called to testify to the World about our wonderful *Christmas gift of grace and truth*. We, too, have received one blessing after another. This is how we know that Jesus is the truth and the life. We were not there at his birth with the shepherds, we were not there to witness John’s testimony, we did not physically see Jesus’ miracles, we did not see his death and resurrection, and we were not there when he showed himself to the disciples.

Christmas is coming and your December orders will be back in time to give as Christmas gifts. Scrip is a substitute for money. They are gift cards for every thing from fast food restaurants, food stores, department stores, gasoline, office product stores and even hotels, cruises and many more. Every month we have an updated **list on the desk in the Narthex**. Everyone who is interested should pick up a copy and at least see what is available.

The percentage the Ladies Guild makes is based on the scrip orders for the month. This percentage is then applied to our **mission projects**. Your support is appreciated. Thank you, Scrip Chairperson, Sybil Grahl.

What Is Scrip?

Scrip is a term that means "substitute money". When you purchase scrip, you're purchasing negotiable gift certificates and prepaid cards that are used just like cash. You can use scrip to purchase everyday expenses like food, clothing, and other essentials, and with every purchase, you earn revenue for our organization.

How scrip generates revenue for you

The Great Lakes Scrip Center acts on behalf of churches, schools and other non-profit organizations to purchase large amounts of scrip from grocery stores, department stores, and other retailers. Because the scrip is purchased with cash up front, the participating retailers offer a substantial discount. Our organization buys the scrip from Great Lakes Scrip Center at a discount, and re-sells the certificates to families like yours for full face value. The discount - from two to fifteen percent or more - is our organization's revenue.

Scrip is "shopping cart fundraising"

Scrip is a popular fundraiser because families don't have to sell anything. Organization members produce revenue by making regular household purchases they would make anyway. Groceries, clothing, toys, gifts, even gasoline can be purchased with scrip.




