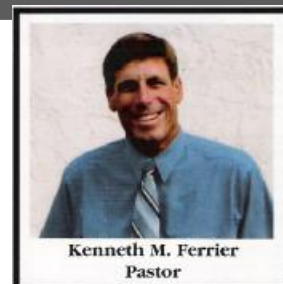


Love Remembers NOT to Forget

"I'm sorry ... I forgot." It doesn't really matter what follows that statement does it? It will still come across as inadequate at best, and lame at worst. We all understand, of course, that lapses of memory DO happen ... even to the most diligent among us. I, myself, apologize on a regular basis when I bungle people's names on Sunday mornings. It's not that names (or anniversaries ... or birthdays) don't matter. It's just that our brains get overloaded sometimes.

That's why—when it comes to something really, really IMPORTANT ... involving someone we really, really LOVE—we take steps to make sure our memories won't let us down. Whether it's a string around our finger or a circle around a date on the calendar, *Love Remembers NOT to Forget*.

When Jacob (Abraham's grandson—heir of the covenant) had his "Jacob's Ladder" encounter with God at a place called Luz (read Genesis 8:10-27), he wanted to make sure he would never forget that place or the blessing God had given him there. So, he changed the name of the place to Beth-El ("The House of God"). But even that wasn't enough. In order to mark the place on the map—and to brand into his brain the events which occurred there—he erected a stone pillar as a memorial. That way, whenever he, or his descendants who would follow him for generations to come, happened upon that site, they would remember God's blessing to them (chosen people/promised land/coming Savior) AND they would never forget the vows Jacob had made to God ... vows which remained binding upon his descendants.

During the Sundays of March there will be a "stone pillar" standing on our Sanctuary. In coming weeks you'll come to better understand what it stands for. If things work out according to plan, our pillar will not only remind us of God's faithful love and our faithful responses, it will actually contain our own personal faith promises.

So ... for now all I'm asking you to do is one thing: PRAY. Specifically, I am urging you to pray that God will work in each of our hearts a faith ... a love ... that remembers not to forget all that He has done for us.



One thing I want to make sure I don't forget is to say THANK YOU to everyone for your many prayers, cards, and well-wishes. I seem to be recovering well from my recent foot surgery, and hope (literally) to be back on my feet by the time you read this.

Stewardship

The Lutheran Church Missouri Synod encourages the study of the biblical Stewardship Principles developed by the Department of Stewardship several years ago. Your Board of Stewardship is presenting in the next several monthly newsletter one of these eight principles. We hope you take the time to read and study these, and that you find them helpful. One of the Stewardship Principles follows:

GOD'S STEWARDS ARE GOD'S STEWARDS

What does this mean:

God's stewards are stewards by virtue of creation and their re-creations in Holy Baptism; therefore, they belong to the Lord.

What does God's Word say about this?

Gen. 1:1 In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth.

Is. 43:1 But now, this is what the Lord says—he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: fear not, for I have redeemed you. I have summoned you by name; you are mine. (cf. 43:1-3a)

Rom. 6:4 We were therefore buried with him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life. (cf. 6:1-11)

2 Cor. 5:16-17 So from now on we regard no one from a worldly point of view. Though we once regarded Christ in this way, we do so longer. Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come! (cf. 5:14-17)

Eph. 2:8-10 For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God—not by works, so that no one can boast. For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.

How is this done?

As children of God through faith in Jesus Christ, and with the Holy Spirit's help, we will:

- Recognize that we are made stewards by God's activity;
- Respect Christian stewards for Whose they are; and,
- Remind stewards that they are God's new creation each day.

As children of God through faith in Jesus Christ, and with the Holy Spirit's help, we will not:

- Use short-cut methods that consider stewards to be merely "donors," "clients" or "customers" or means to an end;
- Neglect to name the name of the Lord who is the Source of all stewardship; or
- Present stewardship as limited to a single area of life, such as money.

Stephen Ministry



Stephen Ministers are caring Christian friends who listen, understand, accept, and pray for and with people who are working through a crisis or a tough time. They are not counselors but trained lay caregivers. Their role is to listen and care--not to give advice or counsel. Stephen Ministers are also trained to recognize when a care receiver needs professional help. They work with care receivers to help them receive the care they really need. Trust is essential in this relationship and confidentiality is one of the most important principles of Stephen Ministry. Whatever the care receiver tells the Stephen Minister is kept in strictest confidence.

The name Stephen comes from the first lay person commissioned by the apostles to provide caring ministry to those in need as recorded in Acts 6. His name is St. Stephen. Our story of Stephen Ministry begins in 1975 at St. Stephen Lutheran Church in St. Louis, Missouri. A young Kenneth Haugk, pastor and clinical psychologist, just graduated from seminary, had a gift of caring ministry. He soon found that the needs of his church exceeded what he could provide alone. After discussing the situation over a cup of coffee with two seminary friends he realized God gave all of us gifts to use in ministry. He soon recruited nine lay people with the gift of caring, developed a training program and by March 1975 the nine were commissioned as "Stephen Ministers". Two of the Stephen Ministers cornered Pastor Haugk one day and said this is so good it needs to be brought to other churches. In November 1975 Pastor Haugk and his wife Joan founded the not-for-profit Stephen Ministries organization and began bringing Stephen Ministry to other congregations. Redeemer Lutheran Church is more than 7,000 congregations from more than 90 Christian denominations that now has Stephen Ministry. Millions of care receivers have been touched by God's love through Stephen Ministry and that is God's doing.

Beginning next month we will spot light one Redeemer Lutheran Church Stephen Minister in the newsletter each month. Know your Stephen Ministers. They all have a heart for the caring ministry.

Please pray that all members recognize that God has bestowed on them gifts for ministry; that members recognize their gifts and find ways to use those gifts in ministry.

Child Care Action Committee

Eleven congregation members enjoyed attending the Child Care Valentine party and look forward to other future opportunities for congregation involvement in the Child Care Program. We hope congregation members will accept the invitation to participate in a tour of the facility as well as to participate in volunteer activities.

Review of Child Care administrative practices disclosed very professional procedures and controls which have been developed and implemented. Monitoring of compliance with regulatory standards by external inspections has resulted in high grades for our program. The Administrative Sub-committee has prepared a comprehensive report on the subject including the history of our Child Care Program.

Re-evaluation of the School Board structure is underway and a draft is under consideration for inclusion in the by-laws of the constitution. We expect this to be finalized in time for review by the Church Council at their March meeting. The objective of this restructuring is to achieve complete integration of the Child Care program (and any expansions thereof) within the Congregational organization structure.

The integration of Child Care financial functions within the overall congregation financial program is continuing. Child Care budget and financial information will become a part of an inclusive congregation report.

The Board of Buildings & Grounds has been meeting with Child Care to assure consolidated property management which can eliminate duplication of effort, contracts, etc.

We are pleased with the cooperation we observe toward achieving our objective of harmonious integration of all congregation functions. We will continue to keep you advised of this Committee's progress as our various tasks are completed.

Child Care

A Child Care Committee has been formed with the intent to help solidify the Child Care as an integral part of a multi – faceted Redeemer ministry. Prior to July 1997, under the direction of Pastor Warren Thomason, a group met with a delegate (Mark Brink) from the Florida/Georgia district who also brought along with him a director and assistant director of Woodland Child Care. After much fact finding and planning Redeemer's Child Care opened in September 1997 and was housed in the building we currently call our Fellowship Hall. As the Child Care increased, so did its needs. A new Child Care building was opened in 2003.

Our licensed director of the Child Care is Shawn Richard. She informs us that the Child Care is working under the guidance of:

2. Redeemer Lutheran Child Care and After School Parent Handbook,
3. First Financial Employee Leasing,
4. Early Learning Coalition of Florida Heartland, Inc.

The Child Care is rated 4 times a year and they have always passed with a high mark.
