It is important that I recommunicate through the newsletter what was said in my report at the Congregational Meeting of April 16, 2023.

I have said before. We are an *ekklesia*. This is the Greek word used in the Bible that often is translated as church. It was used to describe a group of people living in a Greek city/state, that the leadership had called out from the community to do a special task, to accomplish special purpose.

It is a reminder for the fellowship known as Redeemer Lutheran Church that God has called us **out of this world and its culture to be a part of His family, His team, to accomplish His purpose which is to enlarge His family, His team.**

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God our Father, knows each of our skills, abilities, talents and resources because He created us and blesses us. However, He doesn't call us because of those skills, abilities, and/or resources. He calls us because He loves us and wants us to join His team.

And like any good coach, because He knows us so well, He can effectively plug us in to where we can be the most useful using those skills, abilities, and resources with which He has blessed us.

- He knows who we are.
- He knows what we can do.
- He knows what His team can become when we use our skills, abilities, and talents to work TOGETHER.

But like all teams, we need to learn how to work together. And the coach knows what we need to work on.

- Sometimes this work is focused on developing skills.
- ♦ Sometimes this work is focused on how "to have the back" of other team Members.
- ♦ A lot of times, the work is focused on resolving and reconciling.

A team that fights among themselves will never get far.

A team where members don't have the back of another team member won't get far.

Good teams, teams that go deep into the play offs, are teams that not only understand their goal, but also successfully implement the systems put into place to achieve those goals.

There are systems here at Redeemer that need to be analyzed and looked at including:

- ♦ How the church/school finances impact one another.
- How to effectively communicate the financial status of the church/school/day care so all understand the health and vitality of each.
- How to effectively structure the school so it is successful, not only in educating the children, but also reaching out and sharing God's love with the parents.
- ♦ How we govern ourselves through the Constitution and By-Laws.

Members of the team need to buy into the goals if they are going to be successful.

- ♦ The team goal needs to become their goal.
- ♦ The team needs to believe the goal is attainable.
- ♦ The team needs to dedicate themselves to the goal.

Right now for Redeemer your past coach is gone. You are waiting for another coach to come in and work *WITH YOU*. Hopefully the search for the new coach will continue soon. But in the meantime working with your current coach we can do those things that will have us better prepared as a team to work with the new coach God will give to us.

And while we wait we continue - to work, study, pray, and train (strengthen) ourselves. We work harder and more diligently at

- ♦ Forgiving one another
- ♦ Supporting one another
- ♦ Encouraging one another
- ♦ Loving one another in the same way God loves us generously, unconditionally, sacrificially.

Honestly, there are significant challenges before Redeemer right now. But it's not hopeless. It's going to take work.

- For some that means reconciliation
- ♦ For others that means recommitment
- ♦ For everyone it will mean rebuilding TRUST with others in the fellowship.

And that work starts NOW !!!

Follow Him in Generosity

Our Savior calls us to follow Him in generosity. "For I have given you an example, that you also should do just as I have done to you" (John 13:15). We cannot give our lives for the salvation of the world, of course. Praise God, that job's already done! But with hearts full of thanksgiving for what Jesus has given us, we can follow His example of generous giving. And Jesus' generosity is not merely an example. Our Lord also commands us to act according to our gifts: "The one who contributes, [let him give] in generosity" (Rom. 12:8).

So, when we bring offerings to the Lord, we should strive to heed His command and follow the pattern He has established for us. Jesus did not give us leftovers. He gave His best. We should not give leftovers, either, but the first and best of what He has given us. Jesus did not give as an afterthought — He gave according to the plan of salvation God established from the foundation of the world. So, when it comes to our own offerings, we should make a thoughtful plan to give generously, in proportion to the way He has blessed us. Like the Macedonian Christians, who gave according to their ability, and even beyond their ability (2 Cor. 8:3), we should honor the Lord by giving a generous portion of the income that God provides us.

We should also give freely, just as Jesus gave freely for us. There is no compulsion involved in our works of love and our offerings to the Lord. We do not give grudgingly, but willingly and cheerfully, each "as he has decided in his heart", as the Lord says (2 Cor. 9:7). There is no New Testament ceremonial law involved here. Rather, we are free to give as generously as our Savior has given for us!

In the same way, our Lord teaches us to give generously out of our love for Him and for our neighbor. Jesus shows us that genuine love is always love "in deed" (1 John 3:18). It is love that sees our neighbor in need and gives generously to help him. It is love that hears the Word of the Lord and does what it says. If we truly love, we give generously. If we give without love, our giving is not truly following Jesus.


Finally, we follow Jesus in generosity when we support His Gospel ministry and other works of mercy. The people of Israel gave generously to construct and support the operation of the tabernacle, for that was the place where the Lord received the Old Testament sacrifices, through which He bestowed the forgiveness of sins on His people. So, they gave abundantly, so abundantly they had to be told to stop giving! (Ex. 36:5–6). In the same way, we should bring generous offerings to support the Lord's work. We support our congregations in the preaching of His Word, Baptism and the Lord's Supper, which bestow His gifts of forgiveness, life and salvation, and we take care of those who are poor and needy.

Our Savior calls us to follow His example in generous giving. Let us then, with thankful hearts, rededicate ourselves to following Him in generosity.

Exploring God's Word helps you gain a broader understanding of what the Bible means when viewed as a whole – not simply as a collection of individual books.

Table Talk: Table talk is a very informal Bible study now held on Thursday mornings at 9:30 AM, immediately after the 8:45 school chapel service. Participants come with any sort of question. We work to answer those questions from God's Word and from our Lutheran Confessions. In doing that we all learn more about God's Word and its application in our lives. If no one has a question to get the discussion started, we often look at the readings for the coming Sunday. One way or another there is always friendly and interesting discussion.

Pray for us that the Holy Spirit will lead us with His gifts, particularly wisdom. Pray for us that we would show His fruits including love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Pray for our spouses who are giving from their time with us that we may serve the congregation, that we might have peace and joy in our homes.

1 Corinthians 12, as Pastor Mathews has reminded us, describes the Church as the Body of Christ—each part with different gifts. Paul even addresses conflicts within the body. Parts are not the same. Parts do not have the same gifts. Parts may <u>appear</u> more important or less important, but all parts are necessary. When one part hurts, all hurt with it.

How does the body hold together? Paul, inspired by the Holy Spirit, continues in chapter 13—with love. Leaders can do a great job in their roles, but if they don't love, if they are bitter or angry, if they despise or reject others, their works are worthless. Love is patient, kind, not jeal-ous and not arrogant. Pray that your leaders do not seek to be "in charge" or to rule over others rather seek to lead in love. Love doesn't consider a wrong suffered—it forgives. Love bears, believes, hopes, and endures. Pray that we may "put the best construction on everything" not gossiping or complaining as Dr. Luther teaches us in his explanation to the eighth commandment.

Consider reading these two chapters every day for a week, then pray for your congregation and its leaders. Allow the text to guide your thoughts and prayers.

How does the body heal? The body heals when individuals heal their relationship to other individuals. Jesus tells us in Matthew 5:44 to love our enemies and pray for those who persecute us. Pray for those who irritate or frustrate you. When you can, reconcile with them. I have learned that praying for others changes me as much as it changes them. This is the work of the Holy

Spirit in me, producing His fruits in me so that I can treat others with love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. I become a better body part by the Holy Spirit's work in me.

Our congregation has much to be thankful for. It is a choice to see good rather than bad. It is a choice to be thankful. It is a choice to work toward a bright future rather than back to the past. Join your leadership in moving Redeemer forward. Start by praying for us.

In Language they have written a friendly letter with each part including the heading, greeting, body, and closing signature. In writing, they are learning to write a narrative facts story. They will be great reporters soon. In Bible, they have become better at locating scripture references and have learned about Holy Communion.

4th **Grade Update from, Miss Kathy, 4**th **Grade Teacher**. Fourth grade has been slogging through the intricacies of fractions. It seemed impossible at first but they've started figuring out how to make the math magic work for them! Also we just made a great little terrarium in science lab that the kids will be observing at home. They have been really improving in their Spanish, and are up to conjugating 12 verbs!

Scripture songs will also be incorporated into their learning experience. Please encourage your students to be attentive in class for the rest of the year. They were very attentive with the goal of preparing for the spring musical. Now that the musical is past their attentiveness has somewhat drifted.
