REDEEMER LUTHERAN CHURCH - MARCH 2012 "A POETIC PENITENTIAL SEASON"

The Season of Lent is very much underway. The season began with Ash Wednesday on February 22^{nd} continuing through Holy Week (April 1st -6th) and concluding with the celebration of Easter Day, April 8th. So, the entire month of March we live through the season of Lent.

I realize that I have already directed our Lenten devotion to the study of Luther's Small Catechism I would like to also draw your attention to something I discovered in my daily reading of the Catechism. In the fifth chief principle part, Confession & Absolution, I ran across a hand written note pointing to seven penitential psalms. What's a penitential psalm? It is a psalm that expresses extreme sorrow and remorse over sin by the psalm writer. These are the Seven Penitential Psalms 6, 32, 38, 51, 102, 130, and 143. King David happens to be the author of 5 of the 7 penitential psalms.


These seven psalms have served as a special source of prayer and reflection during Lent, for centuries. The tone of their honest pleading is compelling and invites us to turn to our Lord with the same candor and desire.

Our struggles, our sins, our "enemies" - and the ways we describe them - may be different, but these psalms can draw us into coming before our God, as sinners, with real needs. They can help us come to know God's love and mercy. Here is a closer look at each of the seven poetic penitential psalms:

Psalm 6 – Here David pleads with the Lord for deliverance from anxiety, physical discomfort, and sickness caused by a growing awareness of his sinful condition. Luther referred to such mental torment as *Anfechtung*, a German term for the state of despair and doubt we human beings experience when coming to terms with the consequences of our failures to meet the demands of God's Law. Scripture clearly reveals that the result of sin is death (Romans 6:23), but how seriously do we take this threat? Consider this: nearly 2,000 years ago, our sinful condition was so desperate that God sent His only-begotten Son to pay the price. God be praised, right? Through faith in Christ's redemptive work, our

sins have been forgiven.

Psalm 32 – David shows here the physical, mental, and spiritual implications of being silent in sin. Luther writes: "The beginning of this psalm teaches two things: first, that all are in sins (no one is righteous) and no one is



blessed; second, that no on is capable of meriting the forgiveness of sin, but it is the Lord alone who forgives freely by not imputing (guilt). God calls us to confess our sins quickly with contrite hearts in order to receive Absolution. Only He can relieve the troubled heart as St. John writes, "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness (1 John 1:9).

Psalm 51 – David's most well known psalm, this anguished cry of confession from the depths of guilt finds God's absolution and renewal on the certain footing of grace alone. Sin is an inheritance, born in us, ever damaging us. None of our works can ever set us free from terror, despair, or death. However, God has blotted out even the worst of our sins (adultery and murder) by Jesus' sacrifice. "The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise" (v. 17).

Psalm 102 – This orphan psalm (author unknown), reveals that the tears, fever, lost appetite, despair, and doubt are eerily identical to what we go through when a personal crisis erupts in our life or a disaster rips through our town or nation. Yet it is written with confident hope because attention is turned to the God who listens to the pleas of the destitute. When you lament, turn your attention to God's answer to these prayers: Jesus Christ. He stepped into our world and took on our groans and death, restoring hope at the appointed time on Easter morning.

Please give prayerful consideration to filling these needs.

"A POETIC PENITENTIAL SEASON" - Continued from Page 1

Psalm 130 – The psalmist here is in the state of emotional desolation, overwhelmed with misery and guilt. Yet, as he realizes God hears his pleas and grants him full forgiveness, his darkness slowly gives way to light and the hope of "plentiful redemption" (v. 7). If we are honest with ourselves, we must admit the depths of our sinfulness. When we are overwhelmed, God hears our pleas for mercy. He does not remember our sins, but rather grants us free forgiveness through the work of Christ, who gives us hope. Christ plunges into our depths to raise us in salvation.

Psalm 143 – David here pleads for God's mercy, admitting that neither he nor anyone else can stand before God's just judgment. He trusts in God's righteousness and in His name, not his own. This penitential psalm is a profound description of a repentant heart, which receives God's grace. The psalmist, giving up on himself, trusts in God's "steadfast love" (v. 8).

You must agree, after reading the summaries of these penitential psalms, they are applicable to our everyday life. I suggest that because there are seven (7) of these psalms, you might read one of them for each day of the week while you continue to devote your Lenten Season to the reading of Luther's Small Catechism. In doing so, you will realize the beauty of the season of Lent as a poetic penitential season.

SUNDAY SCHOOL NEWS



MY STORY TO SHARE

My name is Larry Jarling. I was born, raised and reside in Danville, IL.

My grandparents and parents were Lutheran and I'm sure my German ancestors before them were Lutheran.

As a baptized Lutheran I always knew I was going to heaven. But, did I have strong enough faith that could guarantee that?

I met and married my wife Sandy and we had two sons. When we met, Sandy was a devoted Baptist. Since both of us felt that we wanted to attend the same church, and raise our family in the same religion, after much prayer Sandy was confirmed a Lutheran. We were and still are active in our congregation. Our boys attend the same Lutheran grade school that I had.

I didn't realize how my faith would be tested until I started having multiple health issues.

Of all my issues the most critical was in 1998 when I was diagnosed with tonsil cancer. I received radiation and chemotherapy. In setting up my treatment schedule the doctor asked me if I had insurance. I told him I had Medicare. He said that Medicare covered 80% and I would be responsible for 20% and that 20% of a lot of money is a lot of money. Sandy had just applied for and was hired that same day ironically at the hospital where I would be treated. However, her insurance that would cover me would not start until she started work which would be two weeks. Sandy called the lady that had hired her and explained the situation. The lady told her she could start the next day and consequently I had immediate coverage. Is there any doubt that the Lord took care of that situation?

The doctor told me that I would suffer the "mother of all sore throats" from the radiation and that my type of cancer was rare and in most cases would return in five years. I can say he underestimated the severity of the sore throat. Sandy said there were several times they thought I would not make it. During the period of my fight with cancer there were times I felt like giving up because I couldn't handle it anymore. Then one day, among the get well cards I received, there was one from Sandy's sister that changed my whole attitude. I carry the verse with me and I would like to share it with you. This is how the card read:

Sometimes it's hard to give up control and ask God to take care of everything. But that's exactly what He wants us to do. For when we let go of our problems, then he can take us by the hand and lead us. I know it's difficult to let go when things aren't good and I wish I could make everything alright for you, but only God can do that. He knows which pathway you should take, and He knows where all the rock places are. So trust Him to guide you through all of this. Give Him your burdens, give Him your hand and He will never let you fail.

From that day forward I have put my complete trust in Him and turned all my burdens over to Him. I know He will care for me in His own way that is best for me. For 12 years now I have been cancer free and my Oncologist sees no reason why it would return. Of course as you can tell, I have side effects of the radiation. My speech is affected due to no saliva and unable to swallow properly. This has caused me to be on a feeding tube and unable to eat anything. I am unable to turn my neck properly since the radiation had caused fibrosis.

It's strange how God gives us hardship that provides us the opportunity to witness for Him. In one of my chemo sessions I was given one of those opportunities. Everyone receiving chemo sits around the room in recliners. This particular day we were having discussions when a gentleman asked me if I went to church. I told him yes and he said that he used to but he no longer went to church and he was afraid of dying. I told him that even though he had not gone to church in awhile, God still loved him and would forgive him just like he did the thief on the cross. Jesus told the thief that "today you will be with Me in paradise". So put your trust in the Lord and he will care for you. Two weeks later I saw his obituary in the paper. I met his son shortly thereafter. He and I had gone to high school together and he said to me "Larry I want to thank you for what you did for my father. My dad was very depressed and fearful because he no longer attended church and was bound to go to Hell. Your words of encouragement and assurance changed his attitude. He said he was now comfortable knowing God was with him".

By several people I have been told that I am an inspiration. They say, "How can you stand not being able to eat, especially during holidays". My reply is, "I have put my trust in the Lord that he will provide what is best for me. He promises not to give me more than I am able to handle. I am still alive and able to do most things that I want.

So that's my story. I was born and baptized for the remission of my sins. The Lord's grace has kept me in faith with the continue promise of forgiveness. I know that he will keep me under his wing until "I get to go to heaven".



Command them to do good, to be rich in good deeds, and to be generous and willing to share. In this way they will lay up treasure for themselves as a firm foundation for the coming age, so that they may take hold of the life that is truly life." Wouldn't it be something if

everyone lived according to these words! As God's stewards we can lead the way and provide a living model of what it means to be stewards, or managers, of all of life and life's resources, including money, property, talents, time and so much more. Our good stewardship will bring glory to God and many blessings to others as well as ourselves. 

GOD GIVES THE GROWTH

In I Corinthians 3:6, the Apostle Paul writes, "I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth."

That is how it is with "evangelism." One Christian tells someone about Jesus, others will tell more, or may even invite that person to church (i.e., "come and see."- John 1:46), but the Holy Spirit is the one who gives the gift of faith and "grows" the church. We don't have to try to convince nonbelievers to believe. That's God's work. All we have to do is share what we believe with others (witnessing), invite them, and pray for them. Is that so hard? Let us pray for God's help to find the courage and the words to speak, and to give us opportunities to speak and invite.

'Speed Witnessing' Workshop

The February 'Speed Witnessing' workshops were very enlightening, motivating and encouraging. I believe it was the best witness workshop that we have had at Redeemer. Pastor's presentation was so helpful to us in inspiring us to "do that which we want to do," but so often lack courage or the right words to say. We all have this trouble—we all want to do what Jesus commanded in Matthew 28:19-20, but we are often afraid to speak or don't know what to say. Particularly in today's world, where time seems too short to talk. But we learned that opportunities abound, and Pastor gave us many conversation starters for different circumstances where time is short, e.g., in line at the grocery store, the post office, a fast food restaurant, the beach, etc. We each wrote a 4-minute version of "our story," how we came to faith, or how God has acted powerfully in our lives. Please see Larry Jarling's story on page 5. We are now to practice our faith story, so that when the opportunity presents itself, we will be ready to share what Jesus means to us. We shared these stories with each other, and they are inspiring. I know that I came away from the training with much more "ammunition," and more dedication to trying to talk to others and share my faith. For those of you who missed the workshop, we will be doing it again.




