"A FRIEND OF THE WORLD OR A REDEEMED CHILD OF GOD"

We can't have it both ways.

No doubt, God's Word is clear: "Do you not know that friendship with the world is enmity with God? Therefore whoever wishes to be a friend of the world makes himself an enemy of God" (James 4:4).

Many of you are probably aware of the recent decision of the Boys Scouts of America (BSA) to allow openly gay boys to join. BSA claims to stand for 12 principles, one of which involves fulfilling duty to God. This change in BSA policy has given implicit consent to the sin of homosexuality. That is, it is OK to be "openly" (unrepentantly) homosexual and a scout. How does that fit into the scout's 12 principles? Well, it doesn't. Indeed, it shows scouts that the leadership of BSA will do what is wrong out of fear of public opinion and fear of standing against the homosexual activists in the USA.

Like many of you, men as well as women (who served as den mothers), I was involved in BSA as a young man. Being part of the scouts was rewarding. I learned much and am thankful for the scouting experience. However, I am disappointed in their change of policy. I pray no physical, emotional, or spiritual harm comes to any young man who remains involved in this worldly organization.

Times sure have changed. Not just with the BSA, but also within society as a whole. My article this month isn't just about the BSA. It's about bringing attention to the rapidly changing world in which we live. It is not safe. Organizations, government, and churches are quickly falling to the pressures of acceptance of every form of sin under the heavens. Again, God's Word is clear: "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect" (Romans 12:2).

I can write for days about why abortion and the homosexual agenda promoting same-sex marriage are wrong in the eyes of God, that is, according to His Word. But that wouldn't be fair to place only those sins under the microscope. To be sure, all sin is wrong in the eyes of God: Your little white-lies, your surfing pornographic websites, your stealing from the company, your cheating on your taxes, and your having too much to drink are all sins in the eyes of God. Therefore, we should be reminded of the log in our own eye rather than focus on the speck in your neighbor's eye (Matthew 7:1-5), right? Not so fast.

It is true Christianity has lost its fight against the homosexual revolution. However, that doesn't mean we as a Christian Church body (LCMS) or as a Christian congregation (Redeemer Lutheran Church) should be so quick to accept the rapidly changing social standards. Everything surrounding the



acceptance of the homosexual agenda should call all Godfearing, Bible-reading, Jesus-believing Christians to stand tall as soldiers of the cross.

What is at stake? The very fabric of the Christian family is what's at stake. The Biblical, traditional family is being tossed into the shredder of social tolerance. Look around you? What changes are you noticing even within your own family, let alone your neighbors? What we have enjoyed growing up as children and then as parents are quickly becoming a thing of the past. The family portrait is taking on an all-together different look. In fact, the faces in that family portrait will be unrecognizable in the eyes of God that is according to His Word. "Therefore a man shall leave his father and his mother and hold fast to his wife, and they shall become one flesh" (Genesis 2:24).

You and I have been blessed by God to become members of His family by the water and His Word in Holy Baptism. God is our Father and His Son Jesus is our Brother. Jesus did everything perfect for us and our eternal salvation; His life, His suffering, His death, His resurrection and ascension. We are redeemed children of God. We belong to His family and are called to live according to His Word.

Moreover, we are called to be witnesses of the grace which has been poured upon us. We are called to speak truth in God's Word to our neighbor. We are called to defend that truth even in the face of death. "Therefore, having put away falsehood, let each one of you speak the truth with his neighbor, for we are members one of another" (Ephesians 4:25). We do not stand idle. We don't remain silent. We love our neighbor.

Yet, this is no easy task. Speaking the truth and defending the truth will almost always result in persecution. No doubt, you will be called a bigot, you will be called intolerant, you will be called closed-minded, and your words will be labeled "hate" language which is unacceptable to our rapidly-changing society.

Remember these words from One who suffered even more: "Blessed are you when others revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on My account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for so they persecuted the prophets who were before you" (Matthew 5:11-12).

And also from Peter, cling to these words of encouragement: "But even if you should suffer for righteousness' sake, you will be blessed. Have no fear of them, nor be troubled, but in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect,

having a good conscience, so that, when you are slandered, those who revile your good behavior in Christ may be put to shame" (1 Peter 3:14-16).

We are soldiers of the cross, which means we are ever marching off to war "not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers over this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places" (Ephesians 6:12). 
Board of Community & Parish Fellowship

When people are in crisis they are sometimes to emotional to speak to people over the phone if they are not a close relation. When a person themselves is ill they may not feel like talking on the phone. Just the phone ringing can be

irritating. A care giver at home may not have the time to take a lot of phone calls. Always gauge the time to call and ask the person if it is a good time to talk. Sometimes they may feel obligated to talk so listen for cues that perhaps this isn't the best time. When talking to the person ask a question related to their feelings and situation. Always ask open ended questions, allowing them to reflect, feel and share. We need to share God's love with that person but be sure you know what their feelings are. Most people have stated that they felt God's love through someone's care, presence and acceptance.

A caring action, if appropriate, is to offer to return answering machine questions for the person in crisis. Sometimes it can be overwhelming with many people calling. When my husband was critically ill our family divided the people that we knew and would keep them updated on his condition.




Stephen Ministry classes began a few weeks ago. We are always interested in talking with anyone wanting to know more about the ministry. There is information in the red communication books in the pews.




SUNDAY ADULT BIBLE CLASS


