

Focusing on the Future

The coming New Year reminds us that change should be a part of our everyday life. It's during this time that we focus on the future by reflecting on the past.

What are our dreams, hopes, and goals for the new year? How do the actions, decisions, and the words we shared with others impact and influence what we hope, dream, and desire for the new year?

What are we wanting to change? What are we willing to change in order to have different outcomes, better outcomes? And in reality, how will our attitude be different towards the things we cannot change – for whatever reason?

Which two teams will play will be determined by the choices made on the field, the impact of weather, the ability to deal with crisis (injuries), the ability to deal with situations beyond their control (poor or missed calls by the referees), and a host of other factors.

The point is this: All NFL teams have the same goal – *to win the Super Bowl*. Why do some teams make it, while others do not?

One factor is the "system" each team has in place to achieve those goals. And habits are the building blocks of systems. What are these teams doing well and doing consistently? What do these teams do to adjust – even on the fly – if the systems seem not to be working as well as before?

In addition, what is the mental mindset of each player? Have they *"bought into the system"*? Do they have the mental toughness to endure tough, pressure situations? Do they have the mental toughness to persevere when things aren't going as planned?

As you look forward to the New Year, what are your plans? As Redeemer looks forward to the New Year, what are our plans?

What systems do we already have in place to achieve those plans and goals? Or, what systems do we need to have in place to achieve those goals if the current system is not up to the job?

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As we move forward, both as individuals and as a congregation, we need to remember who we are – 2 Corinthians 5:17:

Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!

God sees each of us as individuals, and this fellowship called Redeemer as a team fully capable of carrying out the mission He has given to us by using and blessing the resources with which God has already bestowed upon us.

Working with our God we pray, plan, and play the game. That means:

- we gather for worship and study of His Word
- we support and encourage one another when we are challenged or facing difficult obstacles.
- o when obstacles arise, we analyze quickly and execute confidently.
- when mistakes are made by other team members, we forgive and move on, assured that the offending person will continue to give their best and give their all.
- when adjustments are made, they are fully implemented.
- we serve with boldness and confidence.

The Chief Stewards of Humanity: Mom and Dad

St. Paul tells the Ephesians that the first commandment with a specific promise attached to it is, "Honor your father and mother so that it may go well with you, and you may live long in the land" (Eph. 6:2). This promise is one indication of the importance of this commandment. The other thing that highlights the special nature of this commandment is its placement within the Ten Commandments.

The Ten Commandments are clearly organized in two big categories. The first three commandments deal with our relationship with God. This category is called the First Table of the Law. The last seven commandments, the Second Table of the Law, tell us how we should relate to other people. These two tables correspond to what Jesus calls the two greatest commandments: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind," and "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Matt. 22:37–39).

The order of the Second Table of the Law is also important. Murder is a greater sin than adultery, which is a greater sin that stealing, or lying, or coveting. But why is the Fourth Commandment first in the Second Table, ahead of "you shall not murder"? Is disobeying your parents really worse than murder? Or maybe we should give up on thinking these commandments are ordered?

The overall effect of this order is to get us to see our parents as a connection point between our neighbors and our God. Throughout our upbringing our father and mother stand between us and God and deliver His gifts to us: God clothes us, feeds us, protects us and teaches His Word to us through our parents.

So, parents have a very high calling from God. They are called to be stewards of the greatest gift: the gift of life.


Parenting thus gives us a keen insight into all our stewardship. Parents know that they have been given a great treasure in their children, a treasure that does not belong to them, yet for which they feel a great deal of responsibility. Truth be told, every gift we have been given is like this, because everything we have — whether our own personal skills and powers or our wealth and time — is all from God. He entrusts it all to us so that we can use it all and take care of it all for His great purposes.



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BIBLE STUDY



Sunday Morning Bible Study: Bible study on Sunday mornings has resumed. Please join us after the morning service (and after a cup of coffee – approximately 10:30 a.m.). We will be using a study called "Exploring God's Word: Old Testament." Description below is from the CPH website:

Understanding God's Word often means looking at it from a fresh perspective – getting "the big picture" as well as the important details. Exploring God's Word includes 12 individual sessions, maps, charts, a glossary, and a section of intriguing Bible facts. Exploring God's Word helps you gain a broader understanding of what the Bible means when viewed as a whole – not simply as a collection of individual books.

Table Talk: Table talk is a very informal Bible study now held on Thursday mornings at 9:30 AM, immediately after the 8:45 school chapel service. Participants come with any sort of question. We work to answer those questions from God's Word and from our Lutheran Confessions. In doing that we all learn more about God's Word and its application in our lives. We are currently focusing on the book of Exodus. One way or another there is always friendly and interesting discussion.


