### REDEEMER LUTHERAN CHURCH - SEPTEMBER 2012 All Relationships Find Success in these Words: "I Forgive You"

This year has been an exceptionally busy year for me especially in the area of conducting the rite of Holy Matrimony. This year alone I have officiated six wedding ceremonies with another one scheduled in October. Now I don't pretend to be an expert in the area of pre-marriage counseling or counseling in general. However, when looking at what the Apostle Paul tells us about what marriage is in Ephesians 5, there is no mistake in guiding a couple to these words, "I Forgive You." I believe these three words to be vital to the health and success of a marriage between husband and wife.

Any couple will say "I love you" uncountable times, as well they should. But with these words, "I forgive you" reveals that the husband or wife values the marriage more than him or her self. To say these words to your spouse requires a great deal of humility because it means that whatever you once had against the other, you now forget, it is covered in love. And when one forgives another, he or she promises that the matter is over and is able to move forward.

In Ephesians 5, St. Paul explains that marriage is a reflection of Christ and the Church. Christ gave all of Himself in forgiving our sins, and all of the great blessings He gives to us are ours because our sins are forgiven. The writer to the Hebrews says, "Without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness of sins" (Hebrews 9:22). Jesus shed His blood for the sin of the entire world on the cross. Martin Luther also taught this: "For where there is forgiveness of sins, there is also life and salvation" (Small Catechism, Sacrament of the Altar).


Recently I was brought to the attention of an article written by Mrs. Marie K. MacPherson of Mankato, MN. This article was written in October 2011 at The Hausvater Project (www.hausvater.org), entitled "'Return to Me'": The Perfect Marriage Is Founded on Forgiveness in Christ." Here it is for your enjoyment.

Their hands grip tightly. They gaze into each others' eyes. They faithfully promise, "I do." It is a match made in heaven—that almost wasn't made at all.

Several months earlier, the young man and woman were in love. They wanted to spend their lives together. Convinced that this was God's plan for their lives, they became engaged. As the plans for the wedding developed, for one sinful reason or another, the woman became nervous. Was he really "the one"? Did she really want to "settle down"? Had she made the "right" choice? Doubts

overwhelmed her, and rather than place them in God's hands, she worried and stewed. She no longer knew how to proceed. And then, she made the wrong choice.

Still engaged, but her heart confused, she found herself pregnant, by a man not her fiancé. By a man who had no love for her. By a man who



would show no commitment to her newly conceived child. Terrified and ashamed, she tried to distance herself from all those who loved her—her family, her friends, and her fiancé. She quickly broke off the engagement and ran away.

Those who held her dear, especially her husband-to-be, searched for her to no avail. She did not want to be found. She loathed herself and dreaded the wrath of the world, and of God.

He searched until he found her. He pledged that he had not given up his engagement promise, even if she had. He still loved her, regardless of her faults.

After several months of anguish for both parties, word of her situation got back to her family and friends. All expected that the wedding would be called off. But this wouldn't be the case. The groom went after her. He searched until he found her. He pledged that he had not given up his engagement promise, even if she had. He still loved her, regardless of her faults. He would still marry her, and he would love her child as his own. Her guilt was forever in the past, with a glorious future awaiting her, though she deserved none of it.

As they reach around her growing belly to put rings on one another's fingers, Christ-like love abounds. The trial this couple has already endured was certainly difficult, but it is also certain not to be the last. Yet, Christ's example of His undying love for His church shines as an example for them—as for all spouses—to follow.

This story is true. I was honored to be a guest at that wedding.

Amazingly, the One against whom we have sinned longs to forgive us: 'Return to Me, for I have redeemed you.'

Moreover, this true account also is an allegory for a greater truth.

You and I, the Church, have strayed from God and prostituted ourselves to the sins of this world. "You have played the harlot with many lovers; yet return to Me" (Jeremiah 3:1). Amazingly, the One against whom we have sinned longs to forgive us. "I have blotted out, like a thick cloud, your transgressions. ... Return to Me, for I have redeemed you" (Isaiah 44:22). No sin is too great for God to forgive. Your Savior Jesus welcomes you back to His arms, as a bride whom He Himself has made holy and pure (Ephesians 5:26–27). Because His love knows no limits, He has returned you to Himself.

You would agree this was a very touching story to say the least. Whether you are married or single we have all made poor choices, bad decisions in marriage and in life. 

Ephesians 4:28 says, "He who has been stealing must steal no longer, but must work, doing something useful with his own hands, that he may have something to share with those in need." (NIV)

Honest labor provides us with a sense of fulfillment and provides for our own needs and something extra to share with others who are in need. The book of Ecclesiastes includes a number of passages like 2:24; 3:12-13; 22; 5:18-20 that encourage us to find joy in our work. Work is a blessing from God and He gives us the time, talent and resources to do our work in a way that honors God and blesses others as well as ourselves. The words of Hebrews 13:20-21 affirm this truth: "May the God of peace, who through the blood of the eternal covenant brought back from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, equip you with everything good for doing his will, and may he work in us what is pleasing to him, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory forever and ever. 
### SARAH BORZA



### STEPHEN MINISTRY

As Carol explained last month, the main purpose of Stephen Ministry is reaching out to those facing life's difficulties. Normally, this is done on a one to one bases but we also have a responsibility to the entire congregation and sometimes questions are asked of us. For example, when someone has lost a loved one and is grieving, what should I do or say? How long does the grieving process last? We often search for words to say and yet hesitate because we are uncomfortable. Yet, we know as Christians, it is essential to reach out and involve them in the loving community of the church body. We'd like to outline a few guidelines that we pray will be helpful.

- 1. Tell the bereaved that you care. It is never too late to express this and simple words like "I'm so sorry for your loss" can mean so much. As time elapses, let them know that they remain in your thoughts and prayers. There is no time limit for grieving, it can last for years and everyone works through it in their own time. Know that those that grieve find comfort and consolation in words of caring, a personal note, a card, or sharing of a memory of their loved one.
- 2. Being present makes a difference. Many times, your kind words, phone call, warm touch, or note, helps those grieving get through the day. There is usually contact during the early days but as time elapses, the bereaved feel isolated and alone. Reality always sets in. Going to church can be one of the hardest things they do. Look for them as they enter church and greet them, sit with or near them. Include them in your conversations. If there is an event at church, call them and offer a ride. Walking in alone may feel unbearable for them. Invite them to go with you to a non-church event. Even if they refuse, you have told them you care and have not forgotten them. A "yes" answer may be one of the biggest steps they make and it comes because you care.
- 3. Try not to forget important dates such as birthdays, anniversary, date of death or even holidays. Just because time has pasted, out lives go back to normal but theirs will never be the same. They will always recall their loved one on certain occasions. Never assume that because a year or two has passed that grief has run its course. Even if it has, the mentioning of a loved one and how they touched your life is always appreciated. As a church, it shows love and caring.
- 4. Never be afraid to say their loved one's name. As humans, we fear by saying their actual name that is will reopen their grief. Just know, nothing is more comforting to them and will be truly appreciated

On a personal note, my grandson recently was married. He had many memorable moments with his grandfather who had died almost 10 years earlier. Yet, as the wedding was being planned, he was able to include touches in his grandfather's memory. A example was the reading of Psalm 42, knowing it was his grandfather's favorite, a deer was also on the wedding cake. This important time in his life brought to mind how much he missed that relationship. He had showed very little emotion at the time of death but was now, 10 years later, was finally dealing with his grief and was able to talk about it. No matter how much time has lapsed, no matter what the situation is, we need one another in Christian love. Use Christ as your example, love one another as Christ has loved you!

### Some Basic Questions on Witness, Mercy, Life Together



Some years ago I was working with a small congregation in a small town during a vacancy in the pastoral office. The congregation, never large, had been declining in recent years. The previous pastor had left for a more attractive position in another state.

When I asked them why they had no Sunday School, they told me there were no children in the congregation. When I asked them what their mission was, they insisted that just about everyone in town already had a church. They thought there was no mission field. I decided to challenge them. "Go to every other church in town and find out what their average church attendance is, then add up those numbers for all the churches in town." Several weeks later I heard their discovery. On any given Sunday less than half the population of the town was in any church, and many of the congregations also drew from the surrounding country-side. "There's your mission field," we said.

Every one of our congregations is surrounded by a mission field — even yours! I do not know of a single county in the USA where more than half of the population is found in

church, and in many, many locales the percentage is far less than half or even 25%.

No, this is not the time for blame! Don't be saying, "Well if these people were more welcoming or if our members were truly Lutheran, or whatever, we'd be able to do more." Don't be thinking, "Well, if our pastor were a better preacher, or more with the times, or whatever, then we'd..."

Instead, here are some other questions, some basic "Witness, Mercy, Life Together" questions, to ask together, and with God's guidance seek positive answers, TOGETHER:

Witness: Who are the people around us who do not know Jesus? Or have become disconnected from Him? How might we connect with some of them? Where are they? Who among us meets them as part of our various vocations? How might we get to know them so that we have the opportunity to confess the name of Christ? How might we find ways to baptize and teach them?

And we have seen and testify (witness!) that the Father has sent his Son to be the Savior of the world. Whoever confesses that Jesus is the Son of God, God abides in him and he in God (1 John 4:14-15).

Mercy: What are the needs in this community? Who are the "invisible" people in the community? The people no one else notices? How many folks in your community are hurting? Why? Who are they and what are their needs? What do we have to offer them in the name of Christ? How can we be the arms of Christ's mercy for them? How can we find them?

We love because he first loved us. If any one says, "I love God," and hates his brother, he is a liar; for he who does not love his brother whom he has seen cannot love God whom he has not seen (1 John 4:19-20).

Life Together: What is the health of our fellowship? How are we connected to one another? More importantly, how are we connected to Jesus Christ? Are we regularly in the Word of God, remembering our Baptism, receiving our Lord's body and blood, in which He gives life? How many of our people are? Does our congregation live in love with one another as Christ loved us and gave Himself for us?

If we say we have fellowship with Him while we walk in darkness, we lie and do not practice the truth. But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus, his Son, cleanses us from all sin (1 John 1:6-7).

In other words, the things we do as the body of Christ in "Witness, Mercy and Life Together" are part of sanctification. That is, they grow from our justification. Christ has made us His own, forgiven our sins in the blood of His cross, and declared us righteous by His resurrection. Receiving these gifts by faith, we can revel in them, knowing our connection to Christ is sure. Living as His forgiven people, witness, mercy and life together are simply what we do as the body.

Our congregations are all outwardly different. The communities we serve vary significantly. The specific answers to these questions may also look different on the surface. But the purpose is the same — drawing people, by the Spirit's work in Word and Sacrament, into the worship of the Holy Trinity, the only worship that gives life. We witness so that the Spirit might connect some to Jesus. We show mercy that hurting people may receive the love of Jesus. We live together in Christ's Word, because

God is faithful, through whom you were called into fellowship with our Lord Jesus Christ (1 Corinthians 1:9).

Well, what happened to the congregation I was visiting? The Lord sent them a pastor who helped them discover children in the community who needed a place to go after school. Their Sunday School never really revived, but their three hour program for kids Wednesdays after school regularly drew dozens, and even brought parents and families. People were connected to Jesus, and the Spirit grew the congregation.

How will you prayerfully ask these questions in your congregation?
