What I don't miss is the on-going raking and disposal of the leaves in the yard. However what I do miss is the smell of burning leaves in the trash barrel when I was growing up.

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Things are different at Redeemer. Things have changed. That's not new. We live in a world of constant change. And as things change, we are left with memories – some positive and some negative. Even some we wish to forget and others we wish we could re-create and re-live.

But what we need to remember and hang onto whenever the changes of life become unbearable or threatening is that God NEVER changes. We know that from His Word.

#### Psalm 102:27

You remain the same, and Your years will never end.

#### Malachi 3:6

I the Lord do not change.

#### **James 1:17**

Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly lights, who does not change like shifting shadows.

He is the same today as He was yesterday. He will be the same tomorrow as He is today. Every day in my devotions I read the lessons listed for the day from the Daily Lectionary – pgs. 299-304 in the <u>Lutheran Service Book</u>. I write out my prayer of the day to a God who listens, a God who never slumbers or sleeps. And I also make a list of thank-you's – a gratitude list. Every day I begin my list by thanking God for who He is and what He has done for me. It goes like this:

I thank you God for your:

Pardon, patience, peace, presence, protection, provisions, mercy, grace, faithfulness and blessings.

I call this portion of my gratitude list my  $P^{6+}$ .

And that is why we give our offering to God.

**NOT** because

He commands us

The church budget is behind

We are feeling guilty

We've made a deal with God – God, if I give this to you, then please . . . . .

We give our offering to God because it's our way to acknowledge who God is, the great gift He has given to us, as well as acknowledging that what we have – **ALL** that we have – He gave to us in the first place. It's all His. *Does He want it all back?* **NO !!!** But He is pleased when we do give back a portion of those gifts. He is pleased with our consistent, sacrificial giving for it is our way to acknowledge the generous, sacrificial, and unconditional love He shows us each and every day.

It's our way of saying we trust that God will continue to provide.

What is the amount you should give? Look at these passages:

#### Leviticus 27:30

Honor the Lord with your wealth, the first fruits of your crops.

In **Genesis 14:19-20** Abram responds to God's blessings by giving a tenth of all of his possessions. In **Genesis 28:20-22** Jacob responds to God's forgiving and protective hand by also promising to return to God a tenth of the blessings He has and will receive.

The New Testament, outside of the Gospels, does not mention tithing. Instead it stresses intentional, generous, and joyful giving. (NOTE: Intentional means it is not done as an after thought after all your other bills and obligations have been met, but as something that is planned.)

As Redeemer moves into the future and change will continue – because life always means change – the challenge is to become more intentional, generous, and joyful with your giving trusting in God's on-going provision.

## **Stewardship in the First Commandment**

The greatest gift that Martin Luther gave to us was his Small Catechism. The word "enchiridion" is part of the original title of this work. This is the Greek word for "handbook." The Small Catechism is a handbook of the Bible. All the basic knowledge that a Christian needs to understand the faith and live a godly life has been taken from the Bible and distilled into this beautiful little book of Christian piety.

Luther starts with the Ten Commandments.

The First Commandment:

You shall have no other gods.

What does this mean? We should fear, love, and trust in God above all things. (SC I)

We have a God above us. He is the Lord God and we are not. He is Almighty and in control. He is righteous and good. And therefore, we should fear Him.

This God is also our heavenly Father. He wants us to be saved. He does not want us to suffer His just wrath. He has provided salvation for us in His Son, Jesus Christ. And therefore, we should love Him.

Our heavenly Father will never leave us nor forsake us. He has promised as much — and the Bible shows us that He always keeps His promises. So, we should trust Him.

In the Large Catechism, Luther explains how money and possessions form one of the greatest temptations against the First Commandment:

This I must unfold somewhat more plainly, that it may be understood and perceived by ordinary examples of the contrary. Many a one thinks that he has God and everything in abundance when he has money and possessions; he trusts in them and boasts of them with such firmness and assurance as to care for no one. Lo, such a man also has a god, Mammon by name, i.e., money and possessions, on which he sets all his heart, and which is also the most common idol on earth. He who has money and possessions feels secure, and is joyful and undismayed as though he were sitting in the midst of Paradise. On the other hand, he who has none doubts and is despondent, as though he knew of no God. For very few are to be found who are of good cheer, and who neither mourn nor complain if they have not Mammon. This [care and desire for money] sticks and clings to our nature, even to the grave. (LC I 5–9)

These words of Dr. Luther should call us to repentance; sometimes, we live and act like we don't have a Father in heaven. We seek our comfort and peace outside of His gracious promises. But we do have a Father in heaven. He does love us. All His promises are true. And the Lord will surely provide. If that is our belief, then our outward lives will reflect our belief in our acts of generosity and mercy. We will see money and possessions not as gods but rather as tools for doing God's work.


