The following words come from my State of the Parish Address given on January 19th during our Quarterly Voter's Meeting. Although a printed report was made available, I thought it wise to again repeat what I fully believe to be the status of Redeemer Lutheran Church & Child Care.


As some of you were likely not pleased to read my January Newsletter Article concerning the business decisions Thrivent has been making, the truth had to be made known to you. I couldn't keep it hidden from you. A shepherd warns of oncoming danger. Flocks do not guard themselves, shepherds do (Ezekiel 34; John 10).

It is difficult, most of the time, to speak the truth in love when individuals and couples and people you care about so much will become upset and offended at you because you are trying to tenderly show them the way of Christ through His Word, which leads to righteousness and heaven, rather than show them the way of the world, which leads to sin, destruction and hell. And so, before I published my January Newsletter Article, I sent a draft to the Board of Elders. What was their response? To my amazement, overwhelming support!

What had happen was truly amazing, but when it comes to speaking the truth in love, that is, speaking of Christ and His Word, amazing things will almost always happen. My outlook changed because I realized, by the grace of God and work of God, the Board of Elders trusted me (yet not really me, but the truth and guidance given in God's Word). Still, I earned their trust. I earned their respect and therefore they stand, not just behind me, but with me, beside me, on the sure Word of God. Put another way, I received the greatest endorsement of encouragement a man could ever receive among his peers: TRUST. To be sure, I don't deserve it, but it is given by the grace of God through the faithful teaching and preaching of His Word.

Now I don't know if I have earned the trust and the respect from every one of you, as I have the Board of Elders, but I will continue to speak the truth in God's Word in order that godly trust can continue to be

established among all of us. God desires all men, that is, all people to come to Him through the means of His Word of truth. May we then humble ourselves and receive His blessing that we may walk together in unity and harmony,



doing His will and His work to glory of His name in order that His kingdom may increase through the spreading of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

With this renewed confidence and trust, I give you the following message: The Apostle Paul, in his first letter to the Thessalonians, says, "Encourage one another and build one another up" (1 Thessalonians 5:11). With these words from the inspired pen of Paul, I am instructed to encourage you and to build you up. Moreover, I am to instruct you that we are to encourage one another and to build one another up.

Therefore, I proclaim Redeemer Lutheran Church & Child Care to be the year of the ENCOURAGER. That's right, the encourager. We should all be an encourager of one another. The bible is flooded with verses of encouragement, support, hope, and love. Can you imagine the positive change that could take place, not only within each and every one of us, but also among us, all around us if we all become more and more of an encourager to one another?

According to a North America Dictionary, the word encourage, as a transitive verb, offers three distinctive meanings; (1) to give somebody hope, confidence, or courage, (2) to motivate somebody to do something, and (3) to foster something in order to occur or increase. These definitions will serve as an outline for my address.

TO GIVE HOPE, CONFIDENCE, AND COURAGE

STEWARDSHIP

The four Sundays in February are in the Epiphany season of the Church Year calendar. Epiphany is a word that means "showing forth" or "manifesting." The Epiphany season begins on January 6 with the visit of the Wise Men to worship the Baby Jesus as the newborn King of the Jews. The season continues with the baptism of Jesus in the Jordan River, the calling of His first disciples, His preaching the good news of salvation and the opening of His famous Sermon on the Mount. In the four Gospel readings for February we find Jesus teaching that we are lights in this spiritually dark world who give evidence of our new birth as Christians as we love even our enemies and seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness. To live that way is truly an "epiphany experience" to show that we really belong to our Lord Jesus Christ and by the power of the Holy Spirit live renewed lives.

That's what Christian stewardship is all about! Wise Christian stewards manage all of life and life's resources for God's purposes and do it freely and joyfully! We practice the kind of stewardship that is pleasing to our Lord when we give freely and generously of our time to serve in special ways that bless the mission of the church and the people living in our communities. This kind of stewardship is also shown when we freely and joyfully offer our talents and skills to help the church prosper and make life sweeter for those around us. This kind of stewardship continues when we give freely and joyfully of our financial resources to support the work of the church in nurturing believers and reaching out to invite others to know Jesus.

Many people view Christian stewardship as something that we have to do [a command] in order to be true followers of Jesus. That simply is not true! Real Christian stewardship is the privilege of offering all that we are and have to make a difference in this world of spiritual darkness. Just as Jesus came on that first Christmas to bring light to a darkened world, so we are called to follow His example. Will we follow in His footsteps perfectly, use all that we are and have in truly unselfish ways and be willing to make sacrifices so the mission of Christ's church on earth may prosper and become a home for many more redeemed people? No, of course not! We are sinners and will fall short of the glory of God. But, in Christ, God has declared us to be saints because our sins and shortcomings have been forgiven and the Holy Spirit empowers us to let our lights shine so that people will see our good deeds and praise our Father in heaven.

The bottom line for Christian stewards is to hear and obey our Lord's words when he taught: "Seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things [material blessings] will be given to you as well. Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself." (Matthew 6:33-34 NIV).

ENGLEWOOD CROP HUNGER WALK

Set aside Saturday, February 22, 2014 for the 26th annual **CROP WALK**. **CROP** stands for Communities Responding to Overcome Poverty. It is a program sponsored by Church World Service (CWS), a group supported by many Christian denominations. Over 2000 communities around the country participate each year. 25% of the money raised in Englewood stays right here in Englewood. Englewood Helping Hand will use the money to distribute much needed food and assistance to help our less fortunate neighbors. In the past our small community has raised as much as \$20,000. The other 75% will go to Lutheran World Relief (LWR). In 2012 LWR reached



almost 8 million people through 189 projects in 35 countries. LWR operates under the umbrella of CWS. CWS is one of the best charitable organizations in terms of putting the highest percentage of funds in the hands of those that need help. In FY 2011, just 13.3 cents of every CWS dollar went for overhead – 3.7 percent for administration and 9.6 percent for fundraising and information. That means that 86.7 percent went directly to the cause. The National Charities Information Bureau requires that organizations spend at least 60 percent of actual expenses for program activities. As you can see, CWS is a very good steward of our gifts. You can learn more about CWS at www.cwsglobal.org. You can also visit LWR at www.lwr.org. From now until the event we will be in the Narthex handing out packets to recruiters who will be enlisting walkers and non-walkers to sponsor those who do walk. We will also have a donation receptacle for those who wish to make a donation. On February 22nd the walk will start at Community Presbyterian Church in Englewood and walk to Lemon Bay Park and back, a distance of 5 miles. Registration begins at 8 am and the walk starts at 8:30 am. The organizers of this event are hoping for a large turnout so let's show them that Redeemer Lutheran Church and Child Care is behind this wonderful cause.

We also welcome families of Redeemer Child Care to join us on this leisurely walk.


RELAY FOR LIFE

LUTHERAN HOUR MINITRIES

CHRISTIANS KILLED FOR FAITH NEARLY DOUBLED IN 2013

Rev. Faye Pama Musa knew immediately why suspected Boko Haram militants burst into his home last year as his wife prepared dinner in the family's northeastern Nigeria home. His stance against Christian persecution in the divided African nation had long made him a target.

Musa, who served as the general overseer of the Rhema Assembly International Church and secretary of the Christian Association of Nigeria (CAN) in Borno, saw the intruders near the front door of his home in Maiduguri as his wife, Mercy, prepped food. One of the couple's daughters, Zion, had spotted the armed men just seconds earlier jumping a fence.

'Today you are a dead man,' one of the gunmen reported said on May 14 as he dragged Musa to the porch. 'Call your Jesus to help you, Mr. CAN man!'

Zion Musa then begged the attackers to spare her father, a request met with a misfired bullet that caused her to faint. She survived but her 52-year-old father – a man who worked closely with Open Doors, a nondenominational group tracking persecuted Christians worldwide – did not.

Musa, according to the group, was one of 2,123 Christians killed last year due to their faith, compared to 1,201 in 2012. More than half of those reported killings (1,213) occurred in Syria, followed by Nigeria (612) and Pakistan (88).

But North Korea — a country of more than 24 million, with an estimated 300,000 Christians — remained the most dangerous country worldwide for Christians for the 12th consecutive year, followed by Somalia, Syria and Iraq.

"Like others in that country, Christians have to survive under one of the most oppressive regimes in contemporary times," according to a release on the report issued Wednesday. "They have to deal with corrupt officials, bad policies, natural disasters, diseases and hunger. On top of that, they must hide their decision to follow Christ. Being caught with a Bible is grounds for execution or a life-long political prison sentence. An estimated 50,000 to 70,000 Christians live in concentration camps, prisons and prison-like circumstances under the regime of leader Kim Jong-Un."

A sub-Saharan African country — Somalia — was ranked second on the organization's list for the first time. Islamic extremism is the primary source of Christian persecution in the country of more than 10 million and while the capital of Mogadishu is under more moderate Muslim control recently, converts from Islam are threatened with execution, sometimes by the al-Shabaab militant rebels.

"In Somalia, a Christian cannot trust anyone," one Christian reportedly told an Open Doors researcher. "One false confidence and you literally lose your head."

Syria, meanwhile, which had not previously cracked the group's list of top ten most oppressive places for Christians, ranked third last year. Like in Somalia, Islamic extremism powered the prosecution, according to Open Door officials, and many towns that previously had large populations of Christians have become ghost towns.

'The face of persecution in Syria has changed,' the group's World Watch List reads, adding that nearly half of rebels in Syria have a jihadist background. 'The influence of these groups that are linked to Al Qaeda and other extremist factions has risen considerably in the past year.'

More than 80 percent of people worldwide identify with a religious group, according to 2011 survey by the Pew Forum on Religion and Public Life. Of those, 2.2 billion, or 32 percent, identified themselves as Christians, followed by 1.6 billion Muslims (23 percent) and 1 billion Hindus (15 percent).

The survey also found that roughly 1.1 billion people, or 16 percent worldwide, have no religious affiliation, making that segment the third-largest religious group globally and roughly equal in size to the world's Catholic population." Author: Joshua Rhett Miller, published January 10, 2014
