"LEARNING FROM EXPERIENCE"

For as long as I can remember I have always enjoyed engaging in conversation with the elderly. When growing up as a child or teenager, many of us have had wonderful relationships with grandparents. However, my interaction with seniors early on in my life goes well beyond the family unit.

After shoveling snow, raking leaves, or cutting grass for the elderly on the South-side of Chicago in the Mt. Greenwood neighborhood, often I was invited in for a cup of hot chocolate to warm up or a can of pop to cool down. I was a shy young man, so most of the time I sat and listened to them.

Will Rogers was quoted as saying, "I never met a man I didn't like." Well for me, I would say, "I never met a senior I didn't enjoy listening to." I have always been fascinated with what they experienced as a child or as an adult. Certainly some of them became very good at telling their story — a little embellishment here and little stretch of the truth there — but I believe there was much for me to learn by listening about what they had to say.

I have spent many hours listening to the elderly tell their stories about what it was like for them growing up or about their experience serving our country in battle or other sacrifices made for their family in order to keep a roof over their head and food on the table. I can remember their faces, looking into their eyes, the sound of their voice, and yes, I can even remember their names.

Personally, I'm not a great story teller. Perhaps it's because I'm not a senior. Although I have some adult children and some friends who kid around about my age – or is it because of all the grey hair? Regardless, to this day, I still find myself continually attracted to listening to the stories told by the elderly.

God did well calling me into the Office of the Holy Ministry. As a shepherd of God's sheep, my ear is almost always listening to the voice of an elderly man or woman. The stories, however, are a little different than when I listened as a young Chicagoan. They tell me of their pain and suffering. They tell me of their loneliness and feeling as though they no longer serve a purpose in life. One even explained to me what the word invalid (Ĭn'və-lĬd) really means: no longer valid; worthless; without meaning or purpose.

It dawned on me that what he said was that nearly his entire life he felt valid, effective, purposeful, and what he did as a

husband, as a father, as an employee, and as a Christian was validated in his daily living. However, no-longer able to accomplish what seemed routine before; the elderly person has a different attitude about life and living out the remainder of his days.



In reply to his friend Zophar,

who thought Job deserved far worse than he did, Job says, "Does not the ear test words as the palate tastes food? Wisdom is with the aged, and understanding in length of days. With God are wisdom and might; He has counsel and understanding" (Job 12:11-13).

Recently my wife, Lisa, underwent foot surgery which required her to be off her feet for 2-3 weeks. This meant that I, Pastor Kress, would need to do many of the things around the house that she would do and has done very, very well for 26 years. I found myself asking her many questions about things which seemed from appearance easy to do until I was the one responsible for turning on the stove or dishwasher or wash machine and dryer. Oh, I'm sure I could have succeeded in accomplishing any of those important and necessary tasks, but it was made easy simply by listening to the one who had all the experience, Lisa. Listening to her helped meals taste good, dishes sparkle, and clothes clean and smelling fresh. This was all possible because I took the time to listen and learn from experience.

A few weeks ago following the Feeding of the Lambs, I encouraged the children to return to their pews and tell the people seated with them that, "Jesus loves you." A number of the children did and their message was heard. What I should now encourage our youth and young parents to do is to take time to sit and listen to the stories of the elderly. Whether it's a grandparent or a member of the church, they have so much experience and so much to offer the generations that follow them. After all, how did they survive the depression, a number of wars, or a fuel crisis? Ask them. Help them see that their lives are still precious and valid to us. In doing so, we can learn from their experience. We need them. We love them.

If anyone has any old ink or toner cartridges, rather than throw them away you can donate them to the church. By recycling of empty ink cartridges and





STEPHEN MINISTRY

WHAT IS A STEPHEN MINISTER??

A Stephen Minister is someone who has been assigned to a person in crisis and needs caring support. There is only one Stephen Minister to only one person in need. Most Stephen Ministers meet once a week with their care receivers for about an hour. Most care receivers simply need someone to really listen to their difficulties. We deal with feelings, share Christian resources, focus on the process of caregiving and rely on God to achieve results, maintain boundaries, and relate assertively. Above all, we maintain confidentiality. No one knows who the care receivers are or what they have said.

Our training is 50 hours and usually it is 2 hours per week. It is insightful for a person going through the training. The ministers can feel confident in their skills. We have fun in the training. After the training we have meetings the 1st and 3rd Thursday of the month to give encouragement to each other. The encouragement we receive at these meetings lets us know we are not alone in this responsibility.
