The celebration you planned for him and Lanette after services on May 11th was a wonderful outpouring of Redeemer family's love and appreciation. We will surely miss them. And our thanks must also go to Pat Wilcoxen, Church Secretary, who in large part has held us all together with her loving ways - and she continues to do so.

As of this writing on the eve of Holy Trinity Sunday, I have attended several meetings of the congregation, namely the School Board, the Board of Elders, the Outreach Board, and the Church Council. I am sincerely impressed with Redeemer's leaders - with their talent, their commitment to their task, their spirit of cooperation, their love for God's Word and His people in this place, and with their willingness to meet obstacles fearlessly by trusting in God to lead us through to the place He has planned. One excellent example is the progress that has been made in the finances of our Child Care Ministry. No one person can take credit – it involved so many - but Brandy Bilhardt and her staff have done a lot of work. I am so pleased that you all gave them some recognition recently.

Speaking of our Child Care children, Pastor Schmidt has maintained chapel services at 3:30 every Monday in the sanctuary and I am continuing this with great joy. All of you are always welcome. We are teaching these little ones (from age 3 to 5) to sing a little hymn. June 9th they will be joined by the older children of the "Summer Camp." (see the signs on Rt. 776) We would like for this "choir" to sing at a worship service in June. Please pray that mothers and fathers, aunts and uncles, grandmas and grandpas and others come to hear them – and that they hear God's Words of love in Christ Jesus that are always sung and read and preached here. This is the way the Lutheran Church has always added new

believers – this is our mission! By the way, did you know that the LCMS is the largest Protestant school system in the nation? And we're proud to be a part of it!.

Sunday school teaching takes a lot of dedication and work, too! And Summer Sunday School teachers deserve our special thanks because they miss part of the service due to the time schedule. Youth group leaders have the unique job of keeping our teenagers together during the summer until their Sunday School starts again in the fall. So they are planning some fun things like the beach party on June 8th.

There are some other good things coming up this June that will help our Redeemer family become even closer and more friendly. President Ron Beaber is organizing inhome small group social get-togethers that sound like a really fun way to get to know each other better. I will be making Pastoral visits to all the Redeemer families, especially the folks that are new to Redeemer in recent years. I love to chat with you and to bring the service of "Blessing of a Home" to your home. Picnics and parties are also in the works! We are people who have been saved from sin, death, and the devil! Every worship service is a rejoicing and we love to celebrate being "alive in Christ" and just being together.

Speaking of a loving family, our Bereavement committee performed a miracle at Katie Rudolph's memorial service luncheon. We expected 50 people, but there were 150! Our gals fed them all – it was beautiful! Our Stephen Ministers are quietly doing their work of being concerned listeners and trusted friends to many in our family who are hurting. Our Caring Network are never noticed except by the ones who need company, or need someone to sit with a loved one so they can get some respite. I see our organists practicing for hours to make our services special. I see our grounds people taking out the garbage for us. I see our volunteer families cleaning the sanctuary, and changing the paraments, and preparing the altar. I see people counting the offering, keeping the books, ushering, etc., - the list goes on. All of these acts and more are because we love one another.

Our Lord Jesus Christ said, "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you so you must love one another. By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another" (John 13:34-35). What a privilege it is to be a part of such a loving family here - together with you at Redeemer.



A Great Big Welcome to Pastor Thomason as he hits the ground running, taking on the responsibility as our Pastor with a caring attitude and the energy level of a teenager. Let's all support him as he mends fences, gives us pastoral care, and helps us to move forward.

By the time this gets to you, you will have noticed some positive changes. Each Sunday we are welcoming back more and more old friends. The Elders have begun to assist in worship services by assisting with the readings. There is a children's message each Sunday and we are planning several Sundays that the children will participate in the service. Isn't it wonderful the see the smiling faces of the young people? The new sound boards have been ordered and may be installed by this time. There continues to be a positive feeling at the church from the board meetings, to Sunday morning service.

The budget remains in good shape as we enter the long hot summer with a \$25,000 plus balance to the positive as the Council continues to limit spending, and we use a portion of our dedicated funds for unexpected expenses (sound boards for example came out of he General Memorial Fund). I am confident we will remain in good shape as we continue to be prudent stewards.

The Child Care also continues on a positive note as we gear up for the summer program. Thanks to Tim Byrne we have a new bus driver for field trips this summer. The bus driver will also be available to pick up children for Sunday school, and will be on the job for after school pickups for Child Care and Confirmation class members. The new entrance system has been ordered and will be installed as soon as we can get it in place. This will allow parents and staff to enter a number on the keypad to gain entrance, and visitors will be able to contact staff for access. The shed permit has been obtained and the shed is being built, and will be installed as soon as it is ready. The Child Care budget remains in the Black, thanks to the generous gifts from all of you and the help of the fund raisers. I owe a big "Thank You" to Michelle Finley for all her help.

I continue to talk to Pastor Ferrier at least once a week. He is very upbeat and I think he is making progress. We have had a set back as far as his Concordia plan disability is concerned, some of the paperwork from his doctor's has been lost and his benefits have been temporarily suspended until this can be cleared up. We the Church will continue to support him to get him over this latest hurdle. Please remember Pastor, and his family in your prayers.





choice, as I explained on this page in March 1999.

Once I got my second wind from all the cancer therapies, I felt as though my Savlior had plans for me—especially witnessing opportunities, it seemed. So my constant prayer to the Holy Spirit was that He'd give me the right words at the right time and to be alert when He provided opportunities.

Recently in an oncology waiting room, I noticed a young man sitting by himself. He appeared quite ill. Although the room was crowded, no one chose to sit next to him, so I did. His name was Jim, and he wanted to talk, even though it was difficult for him. His wife was with the oncologist, getting his meds for their trip home to visit his family one final time. (It was also where he wanted I to be buried.) Jim was at peace because he knew he'd be with is Savior. I put my hand on his thin arm and said, "Jim, I'm going to pray for travel mercies for you and your wife, and that our Lord will bless and keep you in His arms forever." His eyes lit up, he reached for my hand, and he said, "And I'll pray for you, too, Shay." It was the best and only gift he could give me, and he knew it.

In 2002, Roland, my husband, and I began a Christian cancer support group at Redeemer Lutheran Church in Englewood, Fla. At times, we had only one attendee. Sometimes our group comprised as many as 10 or 12. At each meeting, there would be a devotion, discussion, prayers, and opportunities for each person to learn from others. To Roland and me, it was the ultimate opportunity for witnessing for our Lord. Truly, the group gave us more than we could ever give back. We know there are many support groups out there, but often our healing Savior is not a topic for discussion.

Sadly, two years ago my cancer returned with a vengeance. Because of this, Roland and I moved to Ocala, Fla., to be


