Welcome Back

It's a phrase I have been saying now over the past couple of weeks to our northern friends who have been returning to the Englewood area for the winter. No doubt it will be a phrase in which I will continue to say to the many more returning Redeemer friends and loved ones in the months ahead.

It's a phrase we're all accustomed to saying. However, the implication of the phrase should not be limited to our northern brothers and sisters in Christ returning to our area. The phrase can also be applied to so many others including each and every one of us. How so? When studying Holy Scripture, I have a very close friend who would almost always say, "Context baby! What's the context?"

In considering the context or circumstance surrounding the phrase 'welcome back' let us look at God's word and first the parable of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15:11-32). We're all very familiar with the rudeness of the son who asks his father for his inheritance even while the father is living. The father graciously gives him what he asks. The son goes to a different country and there squanders his inheritance, but while living with swine he remembers how even the workers in his father's fields are treated far better than way he is living. Acknowledging his sin against both his father and God, the son returns to his father's house. But, while he was still a great distance away his father sees him, runs to him, embraces him and welcomes him back. Now he receives him not as a mere worker, of which the son would be happy to be, but with grace and mercy the father welcomes the son back. The sins of the son are forgiven. The son is restored to the father and to his entire household. He was a son again and his father gave a feast to celebrate his son's return.

And so, in this context the phrase 'welcome back' can be applied to every repentant sinner who returns to the Father's house and receives forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation. It isn't what we deserve, nor have earned, but what God the Father graciously gives on account of the saving work of His Son Jesus Christ.

I could stop right there, but then I'm not giving full justice to the phrase 'welcome back.' Certainly we are wel-



comed back in true repentance and faith by the Father through the Son in Word and Sacrament. Certainly we understand it is the Father who speaks to us by the Son through the called servants of Christ saying, "Your sins are forgiven." However, the forgiving shouldn't end there.

When you have sinned against your neighbor, you should go to him and ask him for forgiveness too. In hearing that your sin is forgiven a wonderful thing happens. You are both reconciled to one another. Just as the Father through Christ has reconciled us to Himself, He gave us this ministry of reconciliation (2 Corinthians 5:18-19).

Furthermore, when your neighbor has sinned against you, Holy Scripture informs you that it is you who should go to your neighbor, rather than waiting for your neighbor to come to you. And in your going to your neighbor, do so with gentleness and kindness and most importantly in love and then show your neighbor his sin. If he hears you, you have won him over. However, if your neighbor doesn't hear you, pray and go back another time with the purest intention of gaining your neighbor for the sake of the kingdom of God (Matthew 18:15-17).

And so, there are many implications surrounding the phrase 'welcome back.' Let us then not be quick to judge, but rather be ready every day and each week to welcome back ALL who return, whether it be the northern friend, the wayward child, or a penitent sinner like you and me. Let us together pray this simple prayer, shall we: Father, as You welcome me, grant me joy in welcoming others. Amen.

With the 2010 budget ready for the upcoming Town Hall/Voter's Meeting, and the Child Care rolling along, as well as things running smoothly at Church, it is a great time to be your President. I honestly don't have any major concerns to let you know about. We still don't have a replacement for the Building and Grounds position, but I am confident the Lord will fill this void when he is ready.

The Elders and the Council are considering going to one service year round, probably starting at 9:00 am, or 9:15 am, or 9:30 am with Sunday School/Bible Class following. This will greatly help in many areas, such as ½ the number of greeters, ushers, communion servers, and will help the Ladies Guild reduce the number of workers on communion Sundays. It will also help with the heating/cooling costs on Sunday. There is also discussion of moving Bible Study from the sanctuary to the kitchen area of the fellowship hall when/if we vote as a congregation to make these changes. The thought behind this is that the 8:00 am folks and the 10:30 am folks don't get to see much of each other all winter. The only time we all get together is at the social functions and then we often miss those not in attendance. We will need to go back to two services when we begin to fill the church, and will need to have more than one service on Easter and Christmas. Pastor doesn't have strong feelings one way or the other on this matter. This idea makes sense to me, and it is important to let an Elder or Council Member know how you feel about it. I predict that the biggest concern will be the start time of the church service. At the October 25th Voter's meeting it was voted to wait until December when more of our Northerners are here so we can get their input. The Child Care continues to have over 70 children, with the majority being full time children. Wendy continues to do a great job with the staff and the children. We have a new full time van driver, our own Tommy Kirkland, with Ray Stender being his able back up. We had to let the bus/van driver go because of some problems. Because of the number of children and the profit associated with increased numbers, we have been able to put some of this profit back into the staff and add some benefits. If approved in the budget, it will be nice to reward those that are making the Child Care successful.

The only upcoming event I am aware of is the Annual Talent show. Please sign up today, and if you don't want to perform, plan on attending. There is a rumor that Pastor will be performing.

On November First Christians around the world join in celebrating All Saints Day. Among the saints in heaven are our loved ones who have died in the faith and now share in the joys of heaven. The recommended Epistle reading for All Saints day comes from Revelation 7 and includes these words: *"These are they who have come out of the great tribulation; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. He then Joined the United States Navy and when stationed in Chicago met his future wife Carol where they lived for fifteen years after their marriage. Two children, five grandchildren and forty eight years later he is retired in Port Charlotte, FL. enjoying boating, fishing, woodworking (building a boat) and always trying to complete his honey do list. He is an active elder as well as a Stephen Minister and has occupied seats on all of the boards of a church throughout the years.

Almost two years ago, Joe had the opportunity to lie on his back for almost four months and ponder many things. First he discovered that the everyday tasks that people do without any thought were impossible for him. He also learned that he was not so self sufficient as he had previously thought of himself. He became very quick to realize that at any moment in life you might need assistance be it physical or just for your own well being. It became quite obvious to Joe that most of the care givers attending him were women. Although they were great caretakers they could not fully understand the frustrations that a man experiences when all his life he has been the strong one and he finds himself in a position when he cannot perform the simplest tasks of everyday living.

Joe feels he has a much better understanding of what it feels to be hurting and with God's help he wants to assist others in their pain. The Stephen Ministry training has prepared Joe to minister to other men who might be hurting.

Thank you Joe for your caring attitude and your insights into life during the classes. We all learned from you as well as you becoming prepared for ministry to others.

Christian Support Group

The Christian Support Group meets the last Wednesday of each month at 10:00 am in the church "Quiet Room". An invitation is extended to the members of the congregation. All are welcome.

THE PALM TREE was the topic of the lesson for Wednesday, September 30th. The scripture reading was Psalm 92:12 - the righteous will flourish like a palm tree. The palm is a remarkable tree, and fittingly pictures the life and experience of a child of God. They do not need the touch of human hands. The Christian life, like the palm tree, should manifest true beauty - spiritual and moral.

A striking fact about the palm tree is that it almost invariably grows erect and straight. Seldom do you see a crooked palm. When you see a palm tree that leans in a given direction, you can be sure it is due to some unnatural circumstance such as constant strong winds. The palm tree is by its nature, upright, straight and erect. The Christian life, pictured in God's Word, is a perfectly upright life. The Christian's life is not to be "crooked". It is to be straight and true at all times. Another remarkable thing about the palm tree is that its life is in the center, or the heart of the tree. It is not in the circumference, under the bark, as is the case with most trees. The Christian life does not consist of outward things but is deep, inner, spiritual life. Indeed, a Christian is one in whose heart the Holy Spirit has implanted new, divine life, making him a child of God.

The love of God is poured into the believer's heart by the Holy Spirit - love "which passeth knowledge (Eph. 3:19). The Christian is not to live by outward nourishment from the world but by the inner nourishment that comes from the Holy Spirit through the Word of God. This is part of the meaning of the statement, "The righteous shall flourish like the palm tree" (Ps. 92: 12). The Christian life is a deep, sweet, rich life within.

The Palm tree is master over virtually all circumstances. It flourishes even in barren desert areas where no other plant life can exist. The man of God should, like the palm tree, flourish and be triumphant over all circumstances - wind, storm, fire, drought or deluge. The Christian is always to remain steadfast because he is nourished by an inner life rather than by outward circumstances.

Palm trees and branches have been used as symbols of victory. Triumphant armies, in and before the days of the Roman Empire, carried palm branches when they returned from victories in battle. When Jesus made his triumphant entry into the city of Jerusalem, the people, "took branches of palm trees, and went forth to meet him, and cried, Hosanna: Blessed is the King of Israel that cometh in the name of the Lord" (John 12:13) In Book of Revelation (7:9) the final victory of the saints is portrayed by this description: (They were) clothed with white robes and palms in their hands; and (they) cried with a loud voice, saying, Salvation to our God which sitteth upon the throne, and unto the Lamb"

The Bible certainly has much to say about the Christian life as a life of triumph. We are to be triumphant and victorious over all the circumstances that may oppose us in this world. There are battles, there are seasons of drought, and there are storms, but in all this we have the inner life and power of the Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore, we can always triumph in Him. Palm trees are nourished from springs of water hidden beneath the surface of the earth. They have large, deep roots that go many feet into the earth until they find water for nurture. The hidden source is the secret of their triumph. This is precisely the secret of the Christian life. We are not nourished by the outward things of the world but by a secret spring of living water - the Holy Spirit, who is dwelling within us and strengthening our inner man.

Jesus promised, "Whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst; but the water that I shall give him shall be in him a well of water springing up into everlasting life".

The palm tree is benevolent to mankind, often marking the oases in the desert where travelers may find water. The coconut palm produces both food and drink for the hungry and thirsty. The date palm, of course, produces the sweet and nourishing fruit. Palm oil has had many uses since primitive times. Palms are used for constructing houses and buildings in areas where these trees flourish.

The verse we have been considering, "The righteous shall flourish like the palm tree" (ps. 92:12), conveys both a divine exhortation and a divine expectations. Beauty, uprightness, inner life and strength, mastery over circumstances, nourishment from the divine Source and benevolence to mankind - all these are to be the manifestations of the true Christian life.






2009 Church Actual vs. Budget Year to Date Through September 30, 2009

The costs range from \$60 to \$219, depending on the tests selected. The tests screen for heart disease, stroke, and bone density.

The percentage the Ladies Guild makes is based on the scrip orders for the month. This percentage is then applied to our **mission projects**. Your support is appreciated. Thank you, *Scrip Chairperson, Sybil Grahl*.

What Is Scrip?

Scrip is a term that means "substitute money". When you purchase scrip, you're purchasing negotiable gift certificates and prepaid cards that are used just like cash. You can use scrip to purchase everyday expenses like food, clothing, and other essentials, and with every purchase, you earn revenue for our organization.

How scrip generates revenue for you

The Great Lakes Scrip Center acts on behalf of churches, schools and other non-profit organizations to purchase large amounts of scrip from grocery stores, department stores, and other retailers. Because the scrip is purchased with cash up front, the participating retailers offer a substantial discount. Our organization buys the scrip from Great Lakes Scrip Center at a discount, and re-sells the certificates to families like yours for full face value. The discount - from two to fifteen percent or more - is our organization's revenue.

Scrip is "shopping cart fundraising"

Scrip is a popular fundraiser because families don't have to sell anything. Organization members produce revenue by making regular household purchases they would make anyway. Groceries, clothing, toys, gifts, even gasoline can be purchased with scrip.


