



“Is Our Life a Journey, a Voyage, or a Pilgrimage?”

So often I have heard people say, “life is a journey, not a destination.” Although there may be some credibility in that statement, the statement alone leaves one in the Christian faith empty. By definition a *journey* is the act of traveling from one place to another; a trip. Certainly we experience this type of thing many times in our lives. We go on vacations; we visit family and friends; we even take risky journeys to Wal-Mart or anywhere else for that matter, especially during season here in southwest Florida. Understood correctly, journeys have a beginning and an end. In our lifetime, we have many of them. Some are very short and some are very long.

Just as in our lives, so it was in the life of Jesus. He traveled (journeyed) to many places during His earthly life, but His life here on earth was not just a means to an end, that is, He was here on earth, went through the motions of doing a few things here just so He could return to His heavenly throne. His journeys were with a profound purpose. As is revealed in the Epiphany of our Lord, He, from infancy, was revealed as the “Anointed One” (*the Christ*) of God the Father. In His earthly journey, He fulfilled prophecy marking Him as the only Savior (*Jesus*). The Spirit of the Lord God came upon Him and anointed Him to bring good news to the poor, to bind up the broken-hearted, to proclaim freedom to the captives, to proclaim the year of the Lord’s favor, and to comfort all who mourn. (*Isaiah 61:1-2*)

Jesus physically journeyed from place to place doing many miracles. His purpose performing miracles wasn’t to be some sort of side-show for God. Rather, He came as God, humbling Himself and becoming man in order to save all men. He physically journeyed as a man as we journey. He experienced what we experience. His journeys on earth had purpose.

Our journeys here on earth and in this life also have purpose. We are chosen by God to do His work in this place and in the places we journey. We are His chosen and precious stones being built up as a spiritual house in order to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. We are His own possession that we may proclaim the excellencies of Him who called us out of darkness and into His marvelous light. (*1 Peter 2:4-9*)

We physically journey in this life traveling from one place and to the next. The question is: “Why and for what purpose?” It is a legitimate question, but perhaps the answer can be received in knowing what is God’s work and God’s will for you? Jesus says, “The work of God is that you believe in Him whom

He has sent. His will for you is to look upon the Son and believe in Him and He will give you eternal life.” (*John 6:29-40*) Although our lives here on earth will come to an end, eternal life with Jesus will never end. This is some journey.

So, how about a *voyage*? Is our life also a *voyage*? Again, by definition a *voyage* is a long journey to a foreign or distant place, especially by sea. If you don’t see your life as a voyage, perhaps I can direct you to the boat.

Jesus took earthly voyages on boats and even came across storms. We too have taken trips on vessels afloat on water; to go fishing, a cruise, or even just to visit a neighbor on any one of the hundreds of canals in our area. However, the voyage we share with Jesus began for us in the waters of Holy Baptism. Furthermore, we are members of His church, which is allegorically called the boat. No wonder why the place where we sit and worship is called the nave. It comes from the Latin word *navis* which means ship.

Jesus was baptized by John, yet His true baptism took place in His suffering and death. Jesus once asked His disciples, “Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, or to be baptized with the baptism with which I am baptized?” (*Mark 10:38*) Jesus was making reference to the suffering and death He would endure on the cross. Jesus continued to say, “The cup that I drink you will drink, and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized.” (*Mark 10:39*) Although Jesus’ death on the cross was to atone for the sins of mankind, His disciples, us and all Christians everywhere suffer and die on account of faith in Christ.

The Apostle Paul reminds us that, “do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into His death? We were buried with Him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life ... for the death He died He died to sin, once for all, but the life He lives He lives to God. So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.” (*Romans 6:3-11*) This too is a glorious voyage on the good ship Jesus. A life lived in His church here in time, only to live forever with Him in His church in eternity.

Unfortunately the best way to do this is to address each congregation during their services. This is where Tim Byrne and I have been every Sunday this year when we have not been at Redeemer. As soon as we make our rounds to all of our Lutheran Church's we will be back with you.

We are off to a great start here at Redeemer, with many exciting things to start off the new year. There have been several social/fundraising events, and some special guests to enhance our worship services. We are truly blessed at Redeemer.

Your Council continues to closely monitor the budget, and cut costs when possible. You will notice a new addition to the newsletter this month. We have included a chart to keep you up to date on the Budget, Giving, and Expenses, on a monthly basis and to be able to compare the Year to Date Expenses, and Giving to see how we are doing for the year. Fortunately we are in the black at the end of January.

The Child Care continues to have over 80 children enrolled, and we are getting close to the maximum number of children we can serve. Pastor Kress announced during services that the counsel has approved the addition of a new dedicated fund to start saving for a School and Child Care Building Fund. We will begin the process of seeing if adding a School to the Child Care is feasible. We will cross all the T's and dot all the I's, and if it is God's will, someday we will have a new building for the Child Care and an elementary school. The closest Lutheran Schools are in Sarasota and Fort Meyers, so having one in this area would serve a lot of Lutheran congregations.

I'm sure most of you have seen the new Elder's board in the narthex, so you can look up who your assigned Elder is. He should be calling you in the next few weeks, if he hasn't already. Look up your elder and introduce your self to him.

Stephen Ministry



An overview of Stephen Ministry for the past five years has been impressive as I estimated the number of man hours given by the Stephen Ministers in God's service. We begin by meeting weekly, January through March, to complete 50 hours of education. The last 4 years we have had 14 members of our congregation or 700 man hours of training to become commissioned as Stephen Ministers. Presently, in our 5th. year, we have 2 members in our training class and when commissioned in March we will have completed 800 man hours of training. After the initial training the Stephen Minister attends small group peer supervision meetings 2 hours biweekly each month which totals approximately 672 man hours in a year for the 14 commissioned ministers. After the care giver receives a care receiver they meet usually weekly. We have had 15 care receivers in the past 4 years with the care giver visiting each care receiver for 1,2 or more years, depending on the situation. The Stephen Ministers also have begun an all congregation visitation so you can become acquainted with a Stephen Minister and the minister can become acquainted with you.

We have begun our 5th. year of Stephen Ministry. A thank you to our compassionate, full of faith, skilled, and trustworthy ministers who have listened to the Lord and have been led by the Holy Spirit to bring Christian, healing care to those in need. A thank you to our care receivers who have been brought to us by the Holy Spirit and who have had trust, confidence and love for their Stephen Minister.

Finally, can our life be considered a pilgrimage too? And again by definition, a *pilgrimage* is a journey to a sacred place or shrine. It is a journey undertaken with a specific objective. You probably already know where I'm going to go with this, but allow me to remind you of the sacred pilgrimage of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, especially in this season of Lent.

Jesus made many journeys, took voyages, but His final earthly trip was His pilgrimage to Jerusalem and then ultimately to Calvary and the cross. St. Luke points out for us that long before His triumphal entry into the holy city, “He resolutely set His face toward Jerusalem.” (Luke 9:51) In this Jesus was looking beyond the miracles, far beyond His basic human needs. Jesus was looking toward the goal: His suffering, death, and resurrection.

As we continue in this season of Lent and enter Holy Week, let us look beyond ourselves and take notice of Him who died for our sins in order that we might make our earthly pilgrimage to the sacred place of His church to receive that which He desires to give: forgiveness, life, and salvation.

May we also revisit the pilgrimage of our Lord which He did on our behalf and look beyond the cross and the grave believing and trusting in His words of promise when He said, “I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in Me, though he dies, yet shall he live, and everyone who lives and believes in Me shall never die. Do you believe this?” (John 11:25-26)

In many ways, our life is a journey, voyage, and pilgrimage. However, those who do not believe in Jesus as Lord and only Savior, their journeys have an eternal destination of weeping, and gnashing of teeth. How sad. Therefore, believe in Him who loves you and who has saved you from eternal darkness and has brought you into His marvelous light. His life and light is eternal. Believe in Jesus. Travel safely.

Gratitude for God's Blessings, March 2010

Jeff Foxworthy says that if you know all four seasons—almost winter, winter, still winter and road construction—you might live in Wyoming. A lot of other people in wintry states might say the same thing. But in March we observe the beginning of spring. As the trees and bushes bud, the grass starts to turn green, and the soil takes on a smell of new life, we look forward to the beginning of a new cycle with warmer weather and a new start for seedtime and harvest.

Sometimes as God's stewards we may feel that stewardship is more of the same old, same old. But, just as spring starts a new cycle of life, so also Easter with its joy and celebration starts a new cycle of life for us as God's stewards. During the reflective season of Lent we look forward to the joy and celebration of Easter. This is a great reminder that we are "Easter people," that is, people of hope. Hope is stronger than memory. Memory mostly makes us think about past failures, unfulfilled promises, frustration and disappointment, but hope refreshes us with a new start, not just at spring time, but for every new day.

During Lent we reflect on the extravagant love of Jesus as He went all the way to the cross and death as the perfect sacrifice for our sins and failures. Philippians chapter two reminds us: *"Jesus humbled Himself and became obedient to death—even death on a cross! Therefore God exalted Him to the highest place and gave Him a name that is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father."* (w8-11 NIV)

One day every knee will bow before Christ, even the knees of those who did not believe in Him, and confess Him as Lord of lords and King of kings. Those who do not believe will be forced to bow their knees when they see Jesus coming in glory and then they will go away to everlasting sorrow. By contrast, our knees will bow in humble adoration and our voices will proclaim *"How great Thou art!"*

Just as the earth comes back to life in spring time, so also we are renewed day by day to live as God's redeemed stewards who freely and joyfully manage all of life and life's resources for God's purposes. This new life is not boring! It is exciting as we experience God's power in our lives and look for opportunities in which we can manage our time, talents, relationships and financial resources in a way that honors Him and provides so many blessings to others and ourselves.

Remember stewardship is an offering of your Time, Talent, and Treasures. Don't forget your Time and Talent; we have many current needs that were identified in the Gratitude letter sent to you a few weeks ago. 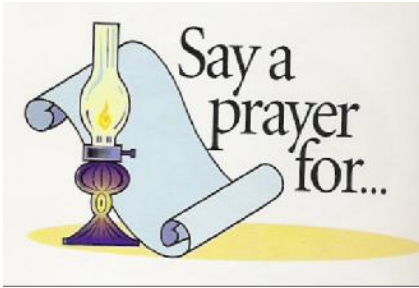

Scrip is a substitute for money. They are gift cards for every thing from fast food restaurants, food stores, department stores, gasoline, office product stores and even hotels, cruises and many more. Every month we have an updated **list on the desk in the Narthex**. Everyone who is interested should pick up a copy and at least see what is available.

The percentage the Ladies Guild makes is based on the scrip orders for the month. This percentage is then applied to our **mission projects**. Your support is appreciated. Thank you, *Scrip Chairperson, Sybil Grahl*.

What Is Scrip?

Scrip is a term that means "substitute money". When you purchase scrip, you're purchasing negotiable gift certificates and prepaid cards that are used just like cash. You can use scrip to purchase everyday expenses like food, clothing, and other essentials, and with every purchase, you earn revenue for our organization.

How scrip generates revenue for you

The Great Lakes Scrip Center acts on behalf of churches, schools and other non-profit organizations to purchase large amounts of scrip from grocery stores, department stores, and other retailers. Because the scrip is purchased with cash up front, the participating retailers offer a substantial discount. Our organization buys the scrip from Great Lakes Scrip Center at a discount, and re-sells the certificates to families like yours for full face value. The discount - from two to fifteen percent or more - is our organization's revenue.

Scrip is "shopping cart fundraising"

Scrip is a popular fundraiser because families don't have to sell anything. Organization members produce revenue by making regular household purchases they would make anyway. Groceries, clothing, toys, gifts, even gasoline can be purchased with scrip.
